Baldivis Sports Complex

Work on the major elements of the Baldivis Sports Complex is rapidly coming to an end, with the main pavilion and change rooms scheduled for completion in June.


Works completed in the first half of 2022 include:

- Fit out and finishes of main pavilion and change room building including all toilets, sinks, flooring, lighting, and change room benches
- Installation of new floodlighting
- Completion of the northern car park including garden beds
- Landscaping throughout the northern half of the site including foot paths, garden beds and planters, and small nature playground
- Installation of security and CCTV.

Works on the Indoor Sports Complex completed in the first half of 2022 include:

- Installation of all structural steel, roof cover, low level roofing and internal ceiling works
- Installation of all building cladding, windows, doors, etc.
- Installation of internal walls
- Commencement of the installation of the sports court flooring.

This exciting new community sporting facility will be ready for the start of the cricket season in late spring.



Koorana Reserve Upgrade

At the time of writing there were only a few items left on the to-do list for the Koorana Reserve upgrade, so by mid-June it should be virtually complete. Work completed as part of the project includes:

- Fit out and finishes of clubrooms including all toilets, sinks, flooring, lighting, change room benches
- Irrigation and turf replacement on the existing playing field area
- Installation of new floodlighting

- Completion of the car parking including garden beds
- Landscaping throughout the site
- Installation of facility security and CCTV.

Once the turf has been established, the upgraded facility and reserve will be ready for the Port Kennedy soccer club to kick off the rest of their season by around the middle of winter, followed by the Hillman Hornets Cricket Club's summer season.



Rockingham Arts Centre

The Rockingham Arts Centre is scheduled to reopen in early July following a \$300,000 refurbishment to improve capacity, flexibility, visual appeal and security.

The Gallery now has a flexible layout with more display space, new art hanging systems, and upgraded lighting. The Multipurpose Room is now brighter and well equipped for regular paint and clay activities. The interior has been reconfigured to increase the size of the storeroom and separate it from the hireable Studio space. New CCTV and security has been installed, along with improved wayfinding thanks to additional signs around the Arts Centre and Gary Holland Community Centre.

Port Kennedy Dog Park

Have you and your pooch checked out the City's newest off-leash dog exercise area in Port Kennedy yet? The park at St Clair Reserve, on the corner of Chelmsford Avenue and Warnbro Sound Avenue, has a separate small dog area and an all-dog area with plenty of exciting play spaces and opportunities for dogs and their owners to socialise. There are obstacles and play elements for the dogs to explore, as well as large grassed spaces, seating, weather shelters, accessible drink fountains and dog drinking bowls, and an accessible footpath. The car park at St Clair Reserve has also been expanded and includes accessible parking.

The new dog park is the City's fourth 'pawpose-built' dog exercise area. The others are at Bayview Reserve (Rockingham), Barri Barri Park (Baldivis), and Seahaven Reserve (Waikiki). Visit **rockingham.wa.gov.au/petrec** for more information.



Greening Rockingham

The City's Parks Services team has a busy planting schedule this winter with about 4,200 trees to be planted across the City's parks, conservation reserves and streetscapes.

The City's Greening Plan 2017 sets out how the City can address the impacts of tree canopy loss across the City. One of the goals is to plant 15,000 trees over five years. Now in the final year there are just 600 trees remaining to reach this target. The remaining 3,600 trees being planted this year are part of our other programs.

The City also receives requests from residents to plant a street tree on the verge adjacent their property. If you would like a street tree please refer to the information on the City's website at rockingham.wa.gov.au/your-services/services-in-your-street/trees


Unfortunately the City loses many of its trees each year through tree deaths and necessary removals. The City aims to replace these trees wherever practical to do so, and this year we will be replacing nearly 200 in various streetscapes and reserves.

In addition to the City's planting programs we have received grant funding for greening works. Thanks to support from the Water Corporation and Western Australian Local Government Association, the City will deliver the Urban Forest Canopy Program with a selection of trees that are endemic to each of the approved locations in Baldivis, Port Kennedy and Warnbro.

Mass planting of native tube stock along the road reserves of Nairn Drive, between Blaxland Avenue and Ridge Boulevard in Baldivis, will commence in June to enhance the visual amenity of the area and screen the properties adjacent to Nairn Drive.

Landscaping of the Tamworth Hill Swamp corner of Nairn Drive and Safety Bay Road, and the road medians, will commence in August.





Plastic Free July

The growing amount of plastic in the sea is causing untold harm to marine life. Improperly discarded plastic products can easily spread within our oceans and are an immediate and local problem. The photo shows some of the plastic pollution collected on our local beaches during the 2019 Seaside Scavenge.

The City has recently joined Plastic Free July, a global movement of people and organisations coming together to end plastic waste. During July, the City will be encouraging its employees and the community to take up the Plastic Free July Challenge. We will also be releasing educational content to demonstrate how you can keep taking steps towards a plastic-free lifestyle.

Here are a few ways to start using less plastic:

- avoid products in plastic, such as bottled water use a reusable water bottle.
- reduce plastic wrap by switching to reusable products.
- bring your own reusable container when getting takeaway.
- recycle the plastic you cannot avoid.

Gold Waterwise Council



The Water Corporation and the Department of Water and Environment Regulation have recently endorsed the City as a Gold Waterwise Council for the third consecutive year.

The endorsement recognises the City's commitment to outstanding leadership in water efficiency and management, both in internal operations and in the community.

To achieve re-endorsement, the City was required to undertake an assessment of its progress against the water efficiency goals outlined in the 2016 Water Efficiency Action Plan. Following this review, the 2021 Waterwise Council Action Plan was prepared to establish new water consumption targets, along with a new set of actions designed to help meet these new targets.

This latest action plan will guide works undertaken by the City over the next five years, continuing to build a more water sensitive City.

Corella Control Program

Visitors to City Park have noticed that quite a few of the mature pine trees, some almost 20 years old, have been stripped bare. This damage, and lots more throughout the City, has been caused by two species of introduced corellas - the little corella and the Eastern long-billed corella.

The corellas are causing significant destruction of the City's tree canopy and ongoing damage to other public and private assets and infrastructure, creating public health issues through ongoing fouling of public spaces, and putting habitat pressure on the threatened black cockatoos and other birdlife.

The City is implementing a corella control program, under a licence to Take Fauna Causing Damage issued by the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA), to reduce the number of these introduced birds to an ecologically sustainable level. No poison is used, and the birds are netted and humanely euthanased in accordance with the DBCA licence.

Culling any wildlife is potentially distressing to some people, but the City has taken this step as a measure of last resort after the non-lethal alternatives used for several years failed to have any impact.

South-Western Snake Necked Turtle Population Monitoring

The South-Western Snake Necked Turtle (*Chelodina oblonga*) is an underwater apex predator that plays a crucial role in maintaining biodiversity in the City's wetlands. The turtles are also beneficial to humans because they help to control nuisance insect populations in urban areas.

In order to assess the health of the City's aquatic ecosystems, in October 2021 the City engaged expert researchers from Murdoch University to continue monitoring the population of these turtles.

The 2021 survey built upon previous surveys by adding seven new wetlands to the original study area. Consistent with previous surveys, the results highlighted a large degree of variability in population abundance across the study area. Adult turtles were also over-represented in captures at 82% of wetlands, providing additional evidence of increased mortality rates amongst juvenile turtles.



If you see a turtle when you are out and about exploring the City's wetlands, please be sure to report the sighting on the TurtleSAT smartphone application or by contacting the City's Coordinator of Sustainability and Environment on **9528 0333**. If you can see the turtle is injured or in distress, contact the Wildcare Helpline on **9528 9055**.

Community Safety

SmartWatch

SmartWatch, The City of Rockingham's community safety patrol service, operates from 12pm - 4am every day of the year. With up to six patrol cars on the road at any given time, the service is focussed on visibility and targeted deterrence actions to enhance community safety.

Each SmartWatch vehicle is equipped with four high definition 360-degree view CCTV cameras which are constantly recording. WA Police can access any of the recorded footage remotely at any time.

Residents can contact SmartWatch to report anti-social behaviour, hooning, neighbourhood disturbances, vandalism, graffiti and suspicious behaviour and activity. SmartWatch also takes patrol requests from residents who may be concerned about specific areas, as well as holiday watch patrols for residents who will be away from home due to travel or work for more than one night. Prepare for Storm Season

Every year from May to October, storms, lightning, hail, flash flooding and gale force winds can cause major destruction in the southern half of WA.

Reduce the risk of injury and property damage with these storm preparation tips:

- park boats and vehicles under shelter and away from overhanging branches.
- trim overhanging tree branches and clear your gutters.
- store or weigh down loose objects around the outside of your home such as outdoor furniture and trampolines.
- pack an emergency kit and check the contents regularly (include items such as torch, wind up radio, first aid kit etc.)
- ensure pets are in a safe area.
- ensure your mobile phone is fully charged ahead of any predicted storms in case you lose power.
- boat owners should securely moor their boats or make sure they are protected on land.
- monitor *emergency.wa.gov.au* for updates and information.

State Emergency Services can be contacted on **132 500** for urgent property repairs that you cannot fix yourself. Call **000** for life threatening emergencies.




