

Artist and Exhibition information

Bricolage is the French term used for a DIY approach and refers to the construction or creation of works from a diverse range of materials that happen to be available. The term is also used in many other fields like anthropology, philosophy, and in the creation of computer software.

Tom was born in Australia but moved to the Netherlands at an early age after his father had died in a car crash. His grandfather was a bricklayer, sculptor, writer and philosopher, his mother, a painter, sculptor, housewife, and a DIY builder/architect. Art was very much part of everyday life.

He went to the Gymnasium, a pre-university high school, but after graduating he decided to travel to South America. Returning to the Netherlands he suffered from culture shock and started to paint on bits of discarded cardboard to try to express himself. Tom also decided he wanted to learn how to work with his hands. As a chef he experienced the world of tastes, smells, fire and organic matter, further igniting his creativity.

Travelling, living and working throughout Europe and the Caribbean, Art became his loyal companion. Self-taught and with an older version of *Art Now* as his modernist, visual bible, his practice meandered through painting, writing, puppet making, and sculpture.

While living in a very old house in the historic city-centre of Antwerp in Belgium, Tom created *The Guardian*, his first puppet/sculpture from waste materials. It was designed to protect him from spirit visitations... and it worked!

A colourful melting pot, influenced by the local, the global, the historical, the contemporary, the personal and the universal, Tom continued finding, recycling, and rescuing precious matter from waste bins in an attempt to restore a cyclic relationship with the earth. He created DIY Art-rituals to deal with the complex and traumatic experiences of his childhood.

Back in Australia as an adult, the bicycle proved to be an effective tool not only for transport but also for Tom's public performances, showing the audience that there are more environmentally friendly ways to do things. In Perth he studied at Central TAFE (now North Metropolitan TAFE) and Edith Cowan University.

Tom lives by his creed of building his relationship with the Earth by minimising his footprint in everything he does. He relies on walking, cycling and public transport, with a design ethos that most of his artwork must be able to be transported by these modes.

He currently lives in the WA wheatbelt in West-Northam, having built his own sustainable dwelling/studio recycling a burnt-out house. He is creating permaculture-sculpture gardens and a drive-through 'Sculpture on the Verge' sculpture park, creating his own myth whilst caring for his piece of paradise on the edge of the man-made desert.
