- Three artworks by Guest Artist Jina Lee.




For Rockingham residents, the FOGO (Food Organics, Garden Organics) waste collection service, introduced in June, offers a powerful way to reduce household waste.

## **Curator's Statement**

Now in its 17<sup>th</sup> year, Castaways Sculpture Awards 2025 provides a visual treat of innovation and inventiveness, with artists creating powerful messages on a range of subjects. Expect to laugh, think and wonder as Castaways sculptural works impart the mysterious, enchanting and wondrous in unexpected ways.

From the very earliest humans, art has been a means to bind communities. Art boosts wellbeing, creativity and imagination, offering intellectual and emotional experiences outside everyday life. The benefits of exposure to art are well known, speeding recovery by lowering stress and improving cardiovascular health. Artists reflect on our world with unique interpretations, broadening our thinking and widening our view of the world.

This year, *The Hut* by Scott Michell conjures carefree, sanguine summer days, with the interactive work inviting you to savour its ambience. The concept of shelter is also a source of inspiration for Liliana Stafford, her work *The Village* representing the place in time of her formative years, filled with heartwarming memories, and *hAU\$*e by Erica Zaino depicts the skeletal foundation of a house, it's mirrored surface enticing viewers to 'inhabit' its reflection.

Entry in Castaways is by a selection process. Castaways also nurtures emerging artists, with Joy Francis and Chamonix Higginson selected for the Castaways Curator Mentor Program this year. In addition to this program, and designed to encourage an exchange of knowledge, Castaways has a Guest Artist, Jina Lee.

Castaways aims to encourage environmentalism in future generations with primary schools and secondary schools featuring in the Schools Exhibition. The Maguette and Small Sculpture Exhibition is also on show for the duration of Castaways at Rockingham Arts Centre, a short stroll from the beach

In a move designed to encourage an exchange of knowledge between more experienced artists and emerging artists, Castaways presents its 2025 Guest Artist, Jina Lee.

Born in South Korea, Jina studied at the Kaywon School of Arts in South Korea, followed by a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from the Korea National University of Cultural Heritage and a Master of Fine Arts in Sculpture at Kookmin University in 2009.

She first exhibited at Sculpture by the Sea in Cottesloe and Bondi in 2015 and relocated to Perth. Now part of the Decade Club at Sculpture by the Sea in Cottesloe, she has been included in exhibitions and symposiums around the world and is director of Western Australia's first stone sculpture symposium, held in 2022.

Jina is one of very few artists working in stone in Western Australia. She forms a personal relationship with every stone she works with, believing that stone is not just a medium, but a living element that carries the Earth's history within it

Through her work, Jina seeks to remind us of our bond with the natural world and with one another, encouraging a moment of pause, reflection, and reconnection in an often fast-paced world.




# Main Exhibition

The Main Exhibition showcases outdoor sculptures set against the beautiful backdrop of the Rockingham Foreshore The exhibited Western Australian artists have all used recycled and repurposed materials to create their sculptures, and those artists vying for the illustrious Major Award have included a 30% visible aluminium component to be eligible for the prize.

#### 1. Gary Aitken

Divergent interpretations recycled aluminium, wood, mild steel \$5,000

"Three figures, one covering their eyes, one their ears, one their mouth. The work reflects on silence, denial in the West, discipline in the East and waste or potential to you."







No Junk Mail steel, timber, aluminium \$2,500

"A recycled 'No Junk Mail' letterbox embodies irony - promoting sustainability while questioning its role: Does it deter junk mail or become another form of it? A thought-provoking paradox!"



#### 3. Jake Coghlan

Recast corten steel, aluminium \$7,400

"Made from the offcuts from a past sculpture, Recast is comprised of over 1000 individual pieces. It considers that negative space can be turned into solid forms through reimagination."



#### 4. Jeff Cork

Precious recycled aluminium, recycled house water hoses \$5,000

"My artwork is recycled from all things that have previously been used for the purpose of water usage. As water is the source of all life on earth, we need to preserve and conserve to sustain life."



#### 5. Joy Francis

Big Dog beer bottle tops, papier-mâché, metal framework, resin **NFS** 

"My dog alerted me to my elderly mother falling and getting injured. *Big Dog* captures her caring nature. She loves Shoalwater Beach and protecting us, the globe she is holding symbolises the world."



#### 6. Damien Gavillet

*Orbital* steel, aluminium **\$6,000** 

"The sculpture is inspired by the orbital paths of electrons about an atom and stars within a galaxy, encompassing the view that everything is connected and nothing is separate."



#### 7. Chamonix Higginson

Lost in Connection aluminium frame, woven cables \$7,700

"A vibrant nest woven from corporate waste, *Lost in Communication* invites reflection on connection, disconnection and the possibility of renewal in our fast-paced, digital world."

#### 8. Rene Lehner

Truly Recyclable 100%...? discarded PVC pipe, aluminium \$5,900

"Aluminium is 100% recyclable without losing its quality or properties. PVC has its difficulties in recycling plus its production, use and disposal release toxic chemicals harming the environment."







#### 9. Scott Michell

The Hut aluminium \$12,500

"This iconic beach hut and surfboard are easily recognisable symbols of coastal life, evoking sunny days, ocean fun, and cherished memories for kids growing up by the sea."

#### 10. Coster Mkoki

Brachial plexus crushed (compressed aluminium), welded steel, found objects \$18,500

"This sequential work stems from my exhibited work, Freedom, Labour of Love. This journey has resulted not only physical pain in the body but emotional too as I work and wait for my visa to be approved."



#### 11. Kim Perrier

De-Vine aluminium \$35,000

"De-Vine is a sculpture that embodies the sacred entanglement of humanity and nature. Twisted vines rise and spiral into the graceful suggestion of a human form, as if grown by time itself."



#### 12. Kelly Robbins

Chains of Change aluminium, plastic, fabric \$2,000

"Celebrating the way in which the recycling of cans and plastics has gradually woven itself into our daily routines, and posing the question of what can we do now about textile waste?"



#### 13. Jane Trinder

Tumble. steel H and I beam offcuts welded, aluminium checker plate \$22,000

"Tread lightly...harmony is a delicate balance, from discarded to meaningful, displaying fragility despite perceived strength."

"Recycling my way to artistic, creative and sculptural joy. Hanna-Bull has arrived"

#### 17. Francesca Geromino

Delicate bloom: the fragility and the rise recycled stoneware. paper clay \$7,000

"Inspired by coral resilience, this totem of three clay sculptures explores strength through fragility, symbolising adaptation, unity and transformation in changing environments."



#### 18. Andrew Mullet

Horsing around recycled metal, stained glass **\$12,000** 

"A connection with the ocean and its amazing creatures is the inspiration for this work. The body is metal rings from wine barrels, the head pulleys of a car engine, the eyes two bronze towballs and the stained glass a contrast to the body."



#### 19. Marite Norris

Sky Signal marine ply, posts, bolts, T-blade, acrylic paint, varnish, pool noodle \$2,000 "Transforming the broken into vessels of meaning, this vibrant totem is reborn from past work, each disc a signal of love, reaching from earth to sky."



#### 20. Fd Stafford

Breathe, Move, Play offcuts of roofing timber, recycled formply, jarrah \$1,900

"I see trees then I see wood. From offcuts of roofing timber I make sculptures. The sculptures play with curves, lines and holes. They breathe and move. A thing to see and touch, remembering the trees."




#### 21. Liliana Stafford

The village recycled glass, recycled roofing timber, aluminium \$15,000 or separately \$1,200 small, \$1,600 large "The village is where I grew up, but it is also a dream - out of reach but heartwarming. The houses hold other worlds of our choosing. Glass was chosen for its fragility, strength and ability to hold light."

## **Schools Exhibition**

The Schools Exhibition showcases sculptures designed and created by Rockingham primary and secondary schools. The artworks created from recycled or repurposed materials are exhibited on the Rockingham Foreshore at Churchill Park, alongside emerging and professional artists in the Main Exhibition

Schools are provided guidance with their sculptures from the Castaways Schools Facilitators and Curator, and learn valuable lessons along the way, including sustainability, student collaboration, creativity, belonging to the community and the pursuit of knowledge and new skills.



#### 22. Charthouse Primary School

Charthouse Wave plastic crayon barrels, plastic string, cardboard puzzle pieces

"Charthouse Wave shows the potential of everyday school waste. A crayon-barrel wave and sea creatures made of puzzle pieces give new life to old items and highlight the beauty of reimagining the discarded."



#### 23. Rockingham Beach **Education Support Centre**

Shell Shocking News wire baskets, metal utensils, scrap wood, plastic kitchen items, bike tubes

"Oblong turtles are under threat and have struggles just like us. Housing shortage, dangerous roads and safety issues. This is something we can all relate to."



#### 24. Rockingham Beach **Primary School**

Peggy the Seabird wire, carpet, fake grass, cans, bottle caps, milk crate, papier-mâché

"Our mission is to inspire accountability for our environmental challenges. By actively contributing to the wellbeing of our community today, we help strengthen the ecosystem for future generations."



#### 25. Safety Bay Primary School

The 114 foam, papier-mâché, plastic bottles, empty threaded CO2 cartridges

"The 114 penguins in our sculpture encourage us to be aware of the numbers of penguins at Penguin Island, based on the 2024 report on the Penguin Island Colony."

#### 26. Secret Harbour Primary School

Home Among the Seaweed pallet, metal pole, bread tags, plastic bottles, plastic cutlery, old flipper, chicken wire, stockings "The seabed is important to the biodiversity of Rockingham. Living among the seaweed is the Western Australian Seahorse, an integral part of the City of Rockingham Coat of Arms. Save the seabeds."



#### 27. Settlers Primary School

Prickly's Playground wire, trampoline springs, placemats, icicle lights, fabric, funnel, recycled clay "With the threat of habitat loss, especially the loss of fallen logs, tree stumps and understory vegetation, echidnas are running out of room to forage, feed and breed in their own playground."



# 28. Sheoak Grove Primary School

A World All Spun Out wood, repurposed wicker Christmas tree, lamp shades, bicycle wheel, metal car differential rotational element, irrigation pipe, plastic bags, scrap fabric, plastic bottles, twist ties, CDs, sewing spindles

"Two worlds on a path of momentum: One whispers promise, the other warns of loss. Which way will our future spiral? A visual reminder that our choices. are twisting the fate of Earth's fragile climate."




#### 29. Treehouse Homeschool



The exhibition celebrates the beauty and intricacy of small-scale three-dimensional artworks created with recycled and repurposed materials, and welcomes both emerging and professional artists from across Western Australia.

#### 5. Sherri Brown

Beacon salvaged fishing line, steel wire \$1,200

"A beacon is a warning or signal. Woven from salvaged fishing line, reflecting the colours of the ocean at sunset, this work endeavours to highlight the danger of overfishing our fragile oceans."



#### 6. Moira Court

Coral Garden ceramic, plastic milk bottles \$420 each or \$1,680 for all four

"Coral Garden is inspired by the detrimental impact of microplastic pollution on coral reef ecosystems. Plastics are found in all parts of the coral reef environment, even within the coral itself."

Take a Deep Breath recycled discarded objects set in resin, acrylic cutout, ceramic fish \$645



Monsieur Whooty timber flotsam, seaglass, old aluminium can, bottle tops, cane, embroidery mesh \$850

"The timber was collected and washed by the tides on the beach over a 30-year period, exposing both nail holes and the work of borers."



#### 16. Michelle Knowles

Ship of Hope clay, linen, thread, driftwood **\$450** 

"Ship of Hope, crafted from repurposed fabric, driftwood and clay represents the optimism found in resourcefulness."



#### 17. Marite Norris

Skybound Heart foam core, papier-mâché, gel medium, acrylic paint, stickers, dowel, wooden block \$200

"Using my trademark bold acrylic colour pallet, this papier-mâché totem reaches skyward. Bursting with joy and love, it stands as a tribute to hope and resilience."

Frag-mented recycled wire, wood, twine, material

"A fragmented sculpture of a numbat, symbolising disjointed forms and the fractured relationship between nature and modernity. Angular segments evoke disruption and fragile ecosystems."

# 25. Erica Zaino


R3B!RD (Rebird / Rebirth + Bird) born again from waste, flying free wood, steel
