**An update and review to the 2018
Heritage List.**

Introduction

The Local Heritage Survey 2025 identified 100 Places of cultural heritage significance. Of these 100 places, 51 are recommended for the Heritage List.

The Heritage List consists of places compiled under the City's Town Planning Scheme No.2 which is reviewed periodically under Local Planning Policy No.3.3.26.

Heritage Lists must be compiled with regard to the research and undertakings for the Local Heritage Survey but they do not contain all places on the Local Heritage Survey. The City includes all places on the Local Heritage Survey with a Management Category of 1 and 2, with some places with a Management Category of 3. The places under the Heritage List require development approval for demolition, alterations or other development affecting the cultural heritage significance of the place.

This Heritage List was adopted by the Council at its Ordinary meeting held on 26 August 2025.

Reading this Heritage List

The Heritage List also includes the locality across the top of the place file entries, as the numbering system for 2025 City of Rockingham LHS is referenced in order of locality.

Planning Policy 3.3.26

The Interiors were added to the Heritage List for 2025. This is reflective of the *Local Planning Policy 3.3.26: Guidelines to Establishing a Heritage List*.

Under this planning policy internal works may require a Development Application to a place on the Heritage List, unless the place is designated as having 'an interior that is not of cultural heritage significance'.

Determining Significant Interiors

Local Planning Policy 3.3.26 provides guidance on how to determine significant Interiors.

As part of this policy:

'cultural heritage significance will be based on the assessment of significance associated with the place, and will be noted as part of the entry of the place in the Heritage List.'



Under the policy, there is a desire for all interior elements and objects be listed within the heritage list, if they are considered to be contributing to the cultural heritage significance of the place.

The policy also describes:

'The absence of such description, however, should not be taken as specification that the interior is not of cultural heritage significance.'

This policy guidance is valuable in the instance where access to the interiors of a Place have not been granted. In the case of private residences within the list, it is often the case that the heritage consultant has not viewed the interiors. In some of these cases, it is likely the place has significant features, of which, cannot be verified by the heritage consultant. In the case where access is denied and works are pending approval, the applicant may require a Heritage Assessment from a heritage consultant. This is only required where there are reasonable grounds that significant interiors exist.

Criteria of Significant Interiors

As a result of the inclusion of interiors into the Heritage List, field entries and definitions were created to describe the interior status. Please see [Table 1](#). Together with a number of other sites in East Rockingham, the place provides tangible evidence of the district's early history and is associated with a number of the district's pioneering families and other individuals who were prominent in the early history of the district. the place was one of the earliest stopping places for travelers on the road between Fremantle and Mandurah, and is one of the few remaining wayside inns in Western Australia that was established during the first fifty years of this state. Notwithstanding its current condition, the architectural composition of the façade of Chesterfield Inn (fmr) has aesthetic merit for its restrained detailing, comfortable proportions, and the symmetrical arrangement of its fenestration which makes the front door the focus of the elevation; the place played an important part in the social and civic development of the district, being the oldest commercial building in the City of Rockingham and also the district's first post office (1915-1918). the dairy is representative of a class of outbuildings commonly constructed in the East Rockingham area in the mid-twentieth century using stone that was locally available.
