EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Rockingham Strategic Metropolitan Centre (RSMC) Plan was approved in 2009. The plan provided the framework for land use change and development. It was bold for its time, promoting different and diverse land uses and streetfront based development types.

The City is now reviewing the planning framework for the Rockingham centre to develop a more contemporary framework that is aligned with the latest State planning framework including draft *State Planning Policy (SPP) 4.2 - Activity Centres for Perth and Peel* and *SPP 7.2 - Precinct Design*.

This project will deliver a new local planning framework which will include the development of a precinct structure plan (PSP) in line with the requirements of SPP 4.2 and SPP 7.2.

The purpose of this report is to document the outcomes of the community and stakeholder engagement undertaken to inform the development of the plan.

Engagement was undertaken through a number of mediums including:

- Online interactive mapping tool
- Community workshop
- Business workshop
- Individual stakeholder meetings
- Survey

In addition, social media was used to promote the project and some feedback was provided informally there.

ONLINE MAPPING TOOL

An online mapping tool was provided to allow the community to share their thoughts and ideas in a spatial manner. 63 comments were received.

The key themes included:

- Waterfront (Foreshore) - Community and arts facilities, trees, reduced speed and movement on Rockingham Beach Road and play spaces
- Waterfront (Coastal Lots) - coastal paths and boat and marine facilities
- City Centre - recreation facilities
- Education/TOD - trees and recreation facilities
- Outside the focus areas - pathway and bike paths

COMMUNITY WORKSHOP

A community workshop was held to seek input into the planning framework review from the perspective of residents and community members in Rockingham. The workshop was attended by 27 people.

The key themes included:

- Greenery and natives
- Cycle paths
- Parking and traffic
- Mix of land uses
- Pedestrian environment
- Play and active facilities
- Update buildings and under-utilised areas

BUSINESS WORKSHOP

A business workshop was held to seek input into the planning framework review from the perspective of businesses in Rockingham. The workshop was attended by 10 people.

The key themes included:

- Providing flexibility in the planning framework to facilitate development
- The City to work with the businesses to facilitate development.

STAKEHOLDER MEETINGS

Stakeholder meetings were held with government agencies and major landholders in the centre to seek input into the planning framework review. Nine meetings were held.

SURVEY

A community survey was undertaken to build on the outcomes of the workshop with all previous attendees and submitters invited to provide comment/response directly and other advised via e-news and social media advertising. 17 responses were received across the five focus precinct areas.

SUMMARY

The key themes identified throughout the engagement period were:

- Support for more native vegetation, greenery and landscaping.
- Support for improved pedestrian and cycle networks.
- Support for more uses such as entertainment, arts and culture, sport and recreation, play spaces and marina.
- Support for activating the foreshore and suggestions to review road speeds and flow.
- Support for more parking.
- Suggestions for free transport.
- Support for iconic design and updating old buildings and suggestions for design that reduces the amount of concrete.

There were divergent views on dwelling types, land uses, building types, densities and building heights dependent on the area, and within areas.

It is recommended that in the development of the Precinct Plan that the vision be reviewed to incorporate the elements valued by the community and to ensure flexibility in the framework to encourage greater investment in Rockingham.

In addition there is an opportunity to provide a greater level of awareness of the framework within the community.



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1. INTRODUCTION

The Rockingham Strategic Regional Centre Plan (the Centre Plan) was approved in 2009. The plan provided the framework for land use change and development. It was bold for its time, promoting diverse land uses and streetfront based development types.

The City is now reviewing the planning framework for the Rockingham Strategic Centre (RSC) to develop a more contemporary framework that is aligned with the latest State planning framework including draft *State Planning Policy (SPP) 4.2 - Activity Centres for Perth and Peel* and *SPP 7.2 - Precinct Design*.

This project will deliver a new local planning framework which will include the development of a PSP in line with the requirements of SPP 4.2 and SPP 7.2.

The PSP will guide future subdivision and development and will bring together the following elements that make up a centre:

- Urban Ecology
- Urban Structure
- Public Realm
- Movement
- Land Use
- Built Form

The existing RSC area is shown in Figure 1.

1.1 PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

A key part of reviewing the Centre Plan is to undertake community and stakeholder engagement to understand how the current plan is working and seek input on the elements being reviewed.

The purpose of this report is to document the outcomes of engagement undertaken as part of this review.

1.2 ENGAGEMENT OBJECTIVES

The objective of the engagement process is to facilitate engagement that enables stakeholders to have input into the RSC PSP and provide communication and engagement support through the formal advertising of the PSP.

The engagement objectives more specifically are to:

- Undertake collaborative consultation through active engagement;
- Raise awareness about the project;
- Develop strong relationships between the City and its community;
- To understand the community and businesses values and sentiments about the centre;
- To test and confirm the vision in the existing plan;
- To confirm the objectives in the existing plan; and
- To test and confirm the built form requirements in the existing plan and to understand how well they are working and if anything requires improvement/ review.

1.3 COMMUNICATION AND ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITIES

1.3.1 Communication methods

Engagement for the project was widely advertised through various channels as follows:

- Social media project advice and updates
- Direct mail out to the precinct area
- Information on the City's website
- City's Rockport portal
- City Chronical (community newsletter)

Stakeholders were directed from the City's website to a dedicated project page on Social Pinpoint (<https://getinvolved.mysocialpinpoint.com.au/rockingham-strategic-metropolitan-centre/map#/sidebar/tab/about>)

The community could view project information, frequently asked questions, access the survey, register for project updates, register for community workshops or do a combination of these things.

1.3.2 Engagement activities

In order to seek feedback, the following engagement activities were undertaken for the project:

- Community and business workshops
- Individual stakeholder meetings
- Online interactive mapping tool
- Online survey





2. COMMUNITY WORKSHOP

2.1 WORKSHOP DETAILS

A community workshop was held on Thursday 17 June 2021. The workshop was attended by 27 community members, three representatives from the City of Rockingham and four members of the consultancy project team.

The workshop was opened by the Director of Planning and Development Services, and facilitated by Shape Urban.

The workshop comprised three components:

- 1. Background:** An overview of the state planning framework, rationale behind the review and the key components of the plan being examined.
- 2. Activity 1 - Local character:** An activity to understand the communities perspective on local character.
- 3. Activity 2 - Build form and land use:** An activity to understand the communities perspective on built form and land use.

2.2 WORKSHOP OUTCOMES

2.2.1 Background

The first part of the workshop focused on a presentation by Hames Sharley, providing an overview of the project.

It is acknowledged that the current plan was bold for its time and enables a range of development types and densities, however good planning involves constant review to ensure the framework meets the current needs to the community and is achieving its objectives.

The review of the Centre Plan has been driven by the age of the current planning framework and changes in state government planning framework, in particular draft *SPP 4.2 - Activity Centres for Perth and Peel* and *SPP 7.2 - Precinct Design*.

The project team identified that the areas of the current Centre Plan requiring moderate to significant change to align with updated state planning framework are:

- Built form (size, shape and orientation of a building)

- Public realm (the public spaces on the street and between the buildings and its relationship with the surrounding area)
- Urban ecology (elements relating to ecological systems, Aboriginal/cultural/ built heritage and environmental/ climate change impacts)

In addition, the project team provided an overview of the context analysis and what currently exists in relation to landscape, public transport, vehicles, land use and development.

The RSC is large and some areas are unlikely to experience significant change

in response to this planning review. As a result, the workshop focussed on five focus areas, where elements of the plan do require a more intensive review.

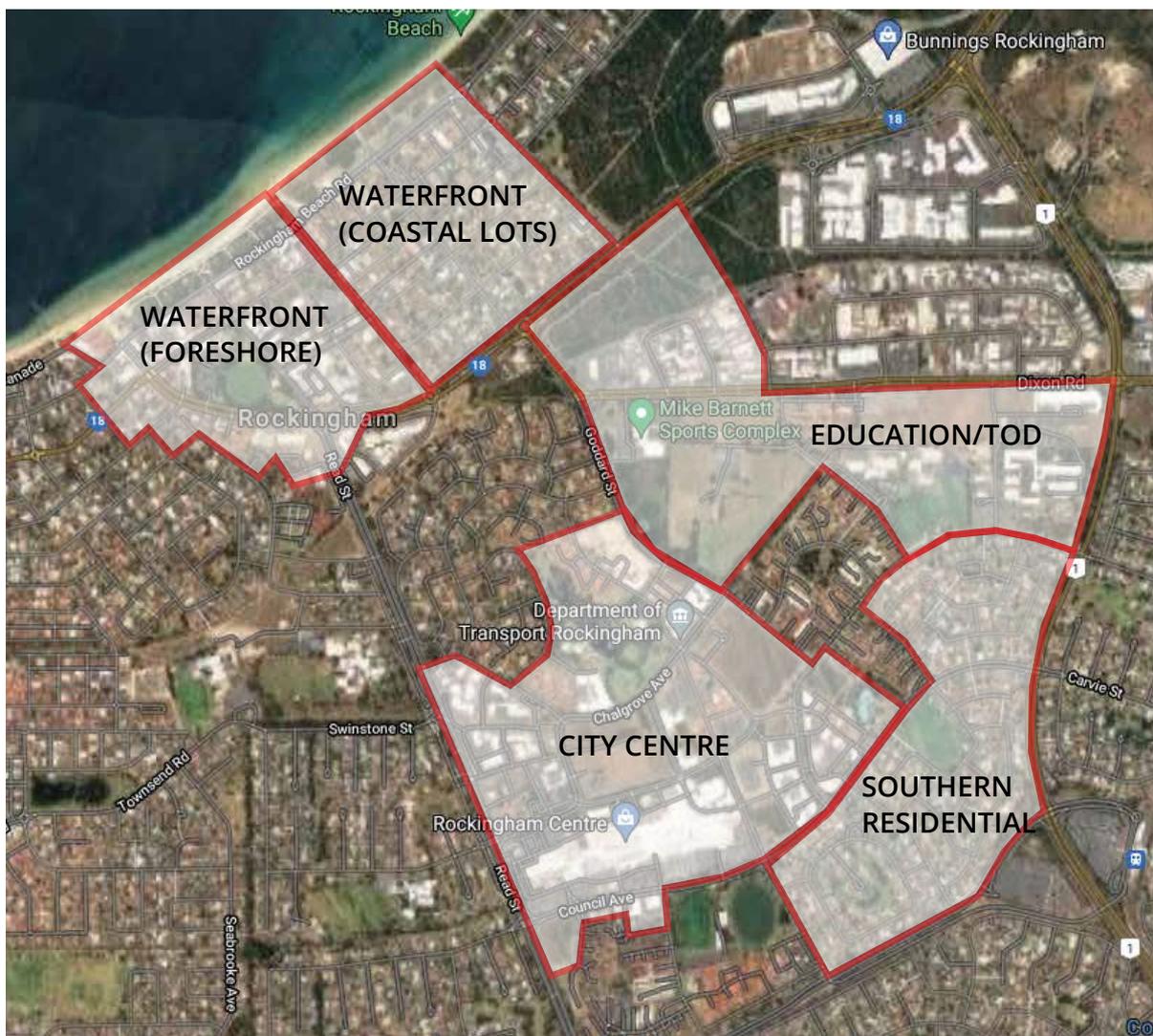


FIGURE 2: ROCKINGHAM STRATEGIC CENTRE - FOCUS AREAS (Map source: Google)

These focus areas are shown in Figure 2 and listed below:

- Waterfront (Foreshore) Precinct
- Waterfront (Coastal Lots) Precinct
- City Centre Precinct
- Southern Residential Precinct
- Education/TOD Precinct

All workshop presentation material is attached to this summary at Appendix A.

2.2.2 Activity 1 - Local character

Activity 1 was an opportunity for the community to share their thoughts on the urban character of the area.

Urban character relates to elements such as:

- Activities that take place in an area;
- How people move through the space;
- The stories people have of the area;
- The physical elements such as buildings, streets and landscaping; and
- How we describe a place

The workshop participants were provided with a map of each of the focus areas and asked to write down characteristics of the area that they like and characteristics they would like to see less of.

A number of comments often related to features and facilities they would like to see in the area rather than relating to what currently exists on the ground.

The following details the common comments raised for each of the five focus areas. A number of unique responses were provided which have not been listed in the table below, however a full list of the comments received is outlined in Appendix B.

2.2.2 Activity 2 - Built form and land use

Activity 2 was an opportunity for the community to view plans that depict the building heights and types allowed under the existing Centre Plan. In groups, the participants were then asked to answer a number of questions specific to the focus areas.

The following details the key comments and feedback received for each of the five focus areas. A full list of the comments and question responses is outlined in Appendix C.

Waterfront (Foreshore) Precinct

- Preference for mixed use residential, (with no clothing to be hung on balconies). Greenery to be provided at the back of each building.
- No more height other than what is currently shown on the map.
- Desire for residential and retail to have gardens, retail/shops to have weather protection less concrete and lots of parking.
- Paths should be wide enough for walking and sitting. CCTV security and lighting to be included.
- People friendly area - potential for a mall. Lots of greenery.

Waterfront (Coastal Lots) Precinct

- More high rise with cafes/restaurants at the front.
- More height suitable on the beach front.
- A minimum lot size of 1500m² is not feasible.
- Family and environmental considerations are valued characteristics of the area.

City Centre Precinct

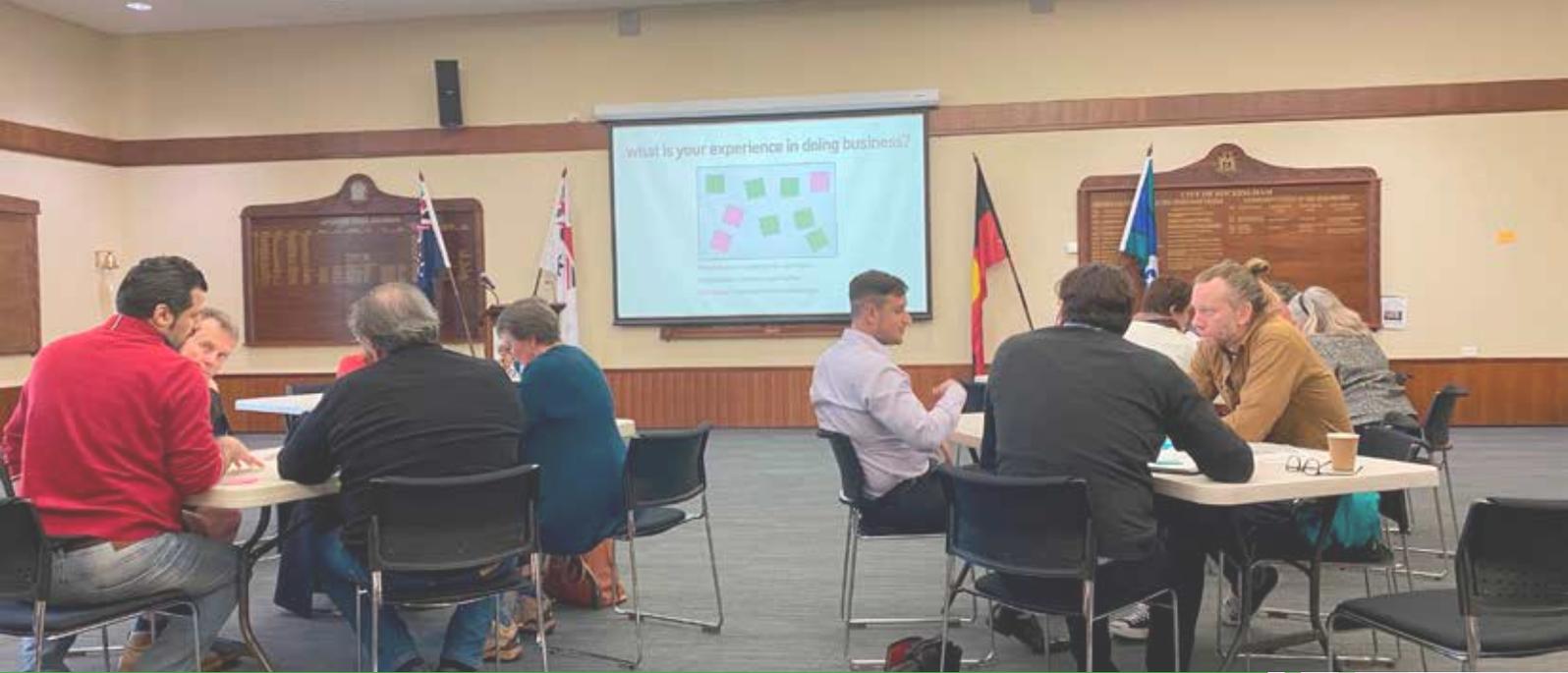
- Consideration of existing landscape, relationship to the coast and sunlight should be considered for buildings
- Commercial area (east of Contest Road) needs more life, community, art, greenery, residential development to improve safety
- Green spaces, community and play facilities would be attractive for living in this area.
- Close, multi-storey parking and passive surveillance to improve shopping centre experience
- More greenery

Southern Residential Precinct

- Preference for single and two storey dwellings.
- The quiet, peaceful characteristic of the area is valued.
- Minimum lot size of 1200m² for redevelopment is difficult as would require multiple landowners to sell and develop.

Education/TOD Precinct

- Transit necessary around education and sporting precinct.
- Wildlife corridors, sporting precinct, entertainment, green space, multi use buildings would be attractive for living in this area.
- Potentially more height near TAFE and Kolbe College.
- More commercial/office/entertainment space
- Sustainable design of buildings
- Green spaces and sporting complex is valued
- Notes - play spaces, public open space, cafes, bars, office, retail, mixed use
- No 15 storeys



3. BUSINESS WORKSHOP

3.1 WORKSHOP DETAILS

A business workshop was held on 28 July 2021. The workshop was attended by 10 members of the business community, three representatives from the City of Rockingham and three members of the consultancy project team.

The workshop was originally scheduled for 1 July 2021, however was postponed due to covid restrictions.

The workshop was opened by the Director of Planning and Development Services, and facilitated by Shape Urban.

The workshop comprised three components:

- 1. Background:** An overview of the state planning framework, rationale behind the review and they key components of the plan being examined.
- 2. Activity 1 - Opportunities and challenges:** An activity to identify the opportunities and challenges/barriers to doing business in Rockingham.
- 3. Activity 2 - Built form and land use:** An activity to seek feedback on the impact of the current planning controls on doing business in Rockingham.

The business workshop focused on the Waterfront (Forehore), City Centre and Education/TOD focus areas.

3.2 WORKSHOP OUTCOMES

3.2.1 Activity 1

A number of opportunities and challenges/barriers were identified by the group. The key themes identified about doing business in Rockingham were:

Opportunities

- Attracting a Government department/workforce
- Planning regulations - reducing red tape.
- City centre - businesses and shopping.
- Foreshore - opportunities for activation, more residential, high rise and retail, improved parking and footpaths.
- Transport - potential for free shuttle/CAT system.
- Environment - relationship with the ocean and outdoors and more verge planting.

- Land use - suggestion for different uses that could be considered such as arts, markets, education, bars, offices and green spaces.
- Built form and development - uniformity in design and identification of sites with development potential.

Challenges

- Land use flexibility
- Parking - requirements and linkages
- Planning system - need for City to work with businesses to provide greater support.

A full list of the comments provided is outlined in Appendix F.



3.2.2 Activity 2

In groups, the workshop attendees worked through a series of questions relating to doing business in Rockingham. The key matters raised are summarised below. A full list of the comments is provided in Appendix G.

It is noted that only one comment was provided for the City Centre which suggested a major arts/convention centre and market in the core of the centre.

Question 1: Are there any existing planning rules (specifically land use and built form) that have impacted your ability to grow and change your business?

Waterfront (Foreshore)

- Flexibility in short term use of spaces
- Insufficient parking and office space
- Building heights
- Leisure and creative activities to entertain

Education/TOD

- Utilise Murdoch University for arts and creative opportunities
- City to work with Murdoch University

Question 2: Are there any desired planning rules (specifically land use and built form) that you would suggest that would enable greater or more rapid growth of your business?

Waterfront (Foreshore)

- Streamlining/robust application system
- Parking
- Transport tram
- Larger setbacks
- More alfresco
- One way traffic
- Mixed use development

Education/TOD

- Streamline transport system
- Cycling network
- City to be active with training facilities

Question 3: If you were to identify one challenge associated with doing business in the RSC (related to the planning system), what would it be?

Waterfront (Foreshore)

- Static planning framework not facilitating innovation and change
- High quality apartment housing
- Shopping, entertainment
- Support for entrepreneurs
- Flexible governing regulations
- Faster planning approvals
- Lack of parking

Education/TOD

- Dedicated City staff to focus and drive this precinct

Question 4: Can you identify any opportunities that would encourage others to do business in Rockingham rather than somewhere else?

Waterfront (Foreshore)

- Increased visibility of unique foreshore precinct.
- Environment
- Update old buildings, modernise
- Planning department improvements
- Parking
- Office space
- Laneway construction - pedestrian access and shelter

Education/TOD

- Improve aesthetics

Other comments (Waterfront (Foreshore))

- Expansion of Garry Holland as a theatre
- Craft/art centre
- Cultural centre at museum
- Major Council parking station (roughly intersection of Kent and Wanliss Streets)

Other comments (Education/TOD)

- Underutilised spaces





4. STAKEHOLDER MEETINGS

4.1 STAKEHOLDERS

The City identified a number of key stakeholders that could have a keen interest in the project and its outcomes due to the size of their land holding or their strategic role in planning and delivering major infrastructure.

The project team met with representatives from:

- Department of Transport;
- Public Transport Authority;
- Department of Communities;
- Development WA;
- Murdoch University;
- South Metropolitan TAFE;
- Kwinana Industries Council;
- Rockingham Kwinana Chamber of Commerce; and
- Two major land holders

In addition, the project team liaised with the Water Corporation and Western Power.

4.2 STAKEHOLDER FEEDBACK

The purpose of the meetings were to provide an overview of the project, understand the strategic intentions and any future plans of the stakeholders and seek feedback on the current planning framework.

The key matters raised are outlined below.

Department of Transport/ Public Transport Authority

- Supportive of establishing a Tier 2 system in Rockingham but needs to be staged / future proofed, bus priority should be the primary short-term focus.
- Parking demand management needed
- Alternative transport/movement options

Department of Communities

- Availability of housing - need for universal flexibility
- Variety of residential offerings - flexibility for different forms of tenure
- Challenge on small lots to accommodate deep soil planting and parking

Development WA

- Protection of Kwinana Industrial Area Buffer essential due to strategic importance. Sensitive land uses must not be provided within.
- Development between Patterson / Dixon Roads would need to consider existing environmental communities
- Development in RSC needs to be cognisant of economic feasibility
 - Difficult to get returns on apartments.
 - Planning controls should be aware of construction change points in the NCC (as these impact costs)
 - More nuanced approach could be considered, interim and temporary development (e.g. Joondalup) with right controls could help with activation.
 - Need to focus attention on the core before prioritising development in other areas

Murdoch University

- Focus of the campus is for engineering and sciences
- Framework needs to cater for change
- Student accommodation
- Integration of sporting facilities

South Metropolitan TAFE

- No current plans for development, but space available on site for future development
- Would be good for the campus to be connected to proposed rapid transport route

Kwinana Industries Council

- Highlighted the importance of preserving the Kwinana Industrial Area Air Quality Buffer, which seeks to minimise impacts of industrial activities (e.g. noise, light, odour, chemical omissions) on adjoining land uses. Additionally, the PSP should ensure that no sensitive land uses (namely residential) are enabled within this buffer zone.
- Consideration of the Kwinana Loop Rail Reserve

Rockingham Kwinana Chamber of Commerce

- Potential for business hub with Chamber of Commerce offices potentially in proximity to Murdoch and Council administration building.
- Red tape can be a barrier for businesses
- Likely be a need for offices in the future
- City released a Business Prospectus

Major Landholder 1

- The rigidity of the planning framework has limited development opportunities
- Challenges of delivering high rise developments given returns (cost of development vs land)
- Some planning controls are too onerous and require review (e.g. street activation)
- Welcome opportunity for Local Development Plans on larger sites

Major Landholder 2

- Plans to close parts of Syren Street to cars
- Provisions such as parking need to be less prescriptive so they remain flexible over time

Utility Providers

Feedback from Water Corporation, Western Power and other utility providers is included in the Engineering Services Report prepared by Cardno.



5. SURVEY

5.1 SURVEY DETAILS

Following the community workshop, a survey was developed to build on the feedback the project team had received so far. Specifically, we were seeking feedback on

- Built form – the size, shape and orientation of a building
- Land uses – the types of activity that happen on the site or in a building
- Movement – how you move around the precinct
- Public realm – the public spaces on the street and between the buildings and its relationship with the surrounding area
- Character – elements that make the area unique and contribute to the amenity

A separate survey was developed for each of the five focus areas. The survey was open between 19 July 2021 and 9 August 2021.

17 surveys were received, specifically:

- Seven relating to Waterfront (Foreshore)
- Three relating to Waterfront (Coastal Lots)
- Three relating to City Centre
- Two relating to Southern Residential
- Two relating to Education/ TOD

5.2 SURVEY OUTCOMES

The response options are shown below the question, with the number of responses shown in brackets. The results below do not include the options which received no response. A full copy of the survey and options is provided in Appendix H. The unique comments are provided in full in Appendix I.

5.2.1 Waterfront (Foreshore)

There were seven responses to the Waterfront (Foreshore) survey.

Question 1: In the Waterfront (Foreshore) Precinct, do you think the current building height limits are appropriate?

5.2.6 Survey Summary

The key themes and comments raised in the survey are outlined below.

- The current heights in the precinct are generally considered appropriate.
- In the Waterfront (Foreshore) Precinct there is support for more extensive targets towards greenery and buildings with good design.
- In the Waterfront (Foreshore) Precinct there is support for more parking, as well as ensuring the area is pedestrian focused in relation to land uses, safety, movement and recreational facilities.
- In the Waterfront (Coastal Lots) Precinct there is support for greenery and cycling infrastructure.
- In the City Centre Precinct there is support for good design, a mix of uses, transport to the waterfront, greenery and seating around the oval.
- In the Southern Residential Precinct there is support for terrace and apartment style housing, reduced car noise, underground power, native vegetation, nature and play spaces.
- In the Education/TOD Precinct there is support for campus, residential and office style buildings, a mix of land uses, greenery, bike networks, facilities around Mike Barnett and sporting facilities.



6. ONLINE ENGAGEMENT

6.1 ONLINE ENGAGEMENT DETAILS

The City's website was used to provide introductory information for the review project and directed the community to a separate engagement portal specifically for the project.

The engagement portal included:

- Project background information
- Frequently asked questions
- Workshop expression of interest registrations
- Project interest registrations
- Online interactive mapping tool

The online mapping tool enabled the community to 'drop' a marker on a map of the precinct plan area and provide comments specific to an area (Figure 3).

Following the workshops, the engagement platform was used to access surveys. The survey results are outlined in section 6 of this report.

6.2 ONLINE ENGAGEMENT OUTCOMES

A total of 63 comments were received on the interactive map. The breakdown of comments received in the different focus areas is outlined below:

- 27 Waterfront (Foreshore)
- 11 Waterfront (Coastal Lots)
- 4 City Centre
- 9 Education/TOD
- 12 outside the focus areas

The most common feedback comments provided in each of the focus areas is provided on page 27. A verbatim list of the comments received is provided in Appendix J.

7. SOCIAL MEDIA

Social media, specifically Facebook, was used to promote the project and any engagement activities.

Facebook posts were shared by the City through their Facebook page. A summary of the posts and their reach/engagement is outlined below.

Project Launch

A post was shared on 27 May 2021 to notify the community that the Rockingham City Centre planning documents were being review (see figure 4). The post received:

- 27 likes
- 9 comments
- 7 shares

Workshop notice

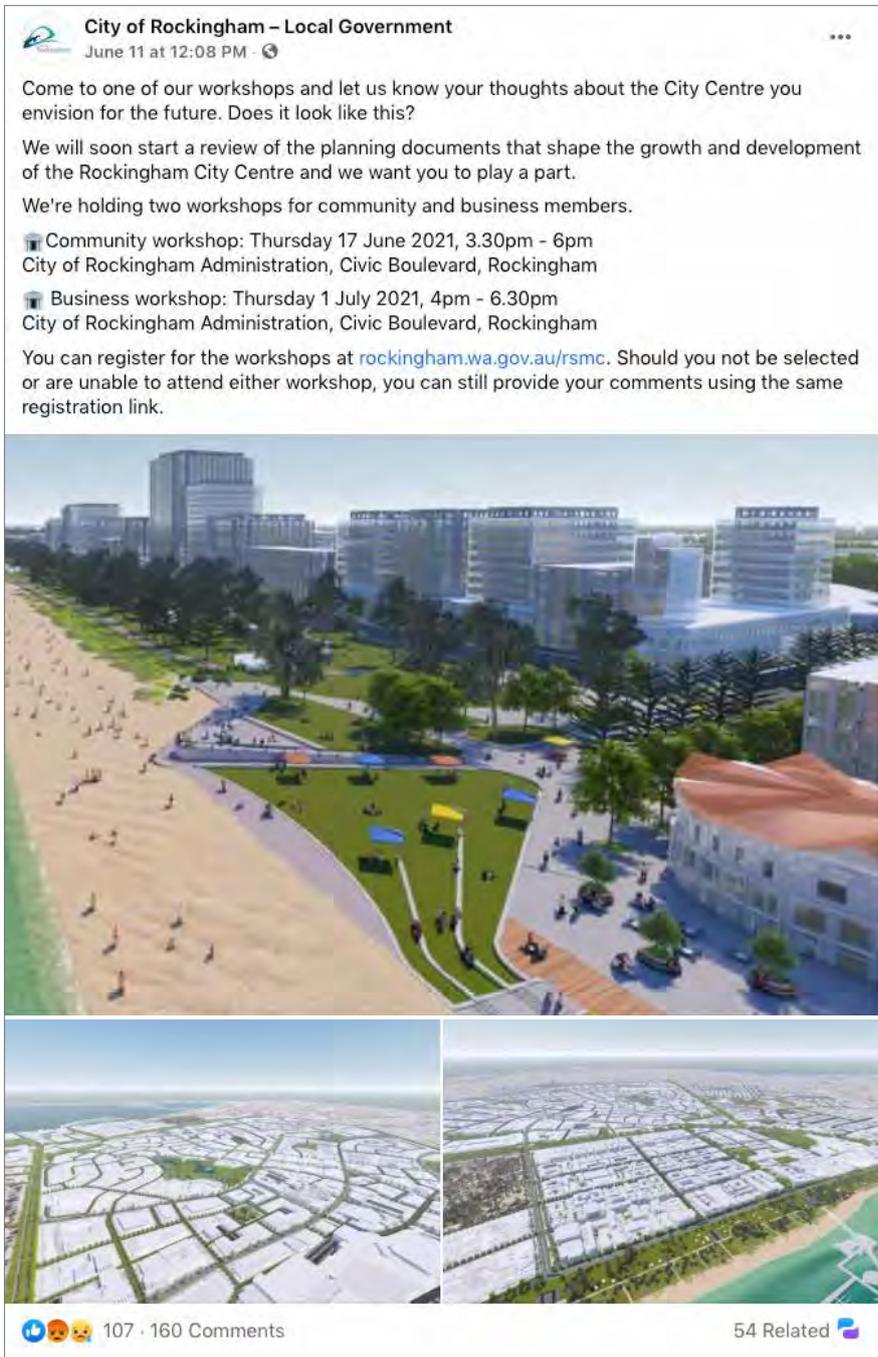


FIGURE 5: FACEBOOK POST - WORKSHOP NOTICE, 11 JUNE 2021

A post was shared on 11 June 2021 to notify the community of the two upcoming workshops (see Figure 5). The post received:

- 107 reactions (52 likes, 28 angry, 12 sad, 7 love, 5 laugh and 3 surprised)
- 160 comments
- 54 related discussions/shares

A large number of comments were received on this post. The dominant themes related to the graphic representation of the future form of the Rockingham Waterfront (Coastal) lots.

The comments indicate that almost none of the respondents are aware of the existing development opportunities available in the planning framework for Rockingham - with many objecting to the height shown in the artists renders.

Notwithstanding, where comments provided more detailed notes, the absence of trees and vegetation in the renders was a very strong theme, and the current availability of parking was highlighted. The Marina at Wanliss Street was also mentioned multiple times (positively).

Business workshop and survey notice

A post was shared on 19 July 2021 to notify the community of the rescheduled business workshop, due to the COVID19 restrictions and of the release of the surveys. The post received:

- 2 likes
- 4 comments

8. SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

8.1 SUMMARY

The community and businesses who engaged with this first phase of the planning framework review, were extremely passionate about the area.

The project team received a broad range of feedback. The key themes identified throughout the engagement period are outlined and categorised based on the design principles of draft SPP 7.2 - Precinct Design.

Urban Ecology

- Strong support for use of natives.
- Support for more greenery, landscaping, wildlife corridors etc.

Urban Structure

- Suggestion for improved permeation for pedestrian movement.
- Suggestions around traffic movement along Rockingham Beach Road.

Public Realm

- Support for improved pedestrian environment - paths, lighting, crossings etc.
- Support for play spaces and recreation facilities.

- Support for more greenery.
- Support for activating the foreshore.
- Support for beautification of area e.g. through artwork, colour, greenery etc.

Movement

- Support for improved cycling networks/ facilities.
- Support for good pedestrian network (paths, crossings).
- Suggestion to reduce traffic speeds and volumes along Rockingham Beach Road.
- Support for more parking.
- Suggestion for a free CAT service/ shuttle through the precinct.

Land Use

- Support for more entertainment and active uses.
- Support for community, arts and culture facilities.
- Support for sport and recreation facilities.
- Support for proposed marina.

There was divergent perspectives on dwelling types and land uses dependent on the area, and within areas.

Built Form

- Support to update and modernise old buildings .
- Suggest for design that reduces concrete on buildings.
- Support for iconic design.

There were divergent views on building types, densities and building heights dependent on the area, and within areas.

Other comments

- Ensuring flexibility in the planning framework to consider new and innovative ideas and to remain robust.
- A planning system that works with the proponent as a partner rather than a regulator.
- Better utilisation of vacant land.
- Appreciation of the coastal atmosphere, welcoming character and the people.

8.2 RECOMMENDATIONS

Moving forward into the next phase of this project, there were a number of key areas which should be further considered.

Vision and principles

The current centre plan vision is:

'For a modern, distinctly coastal centre offering a wide range of mixed uses including retail, commercial, office, civic, residential, education and recreation within an accessible and highly inter-connected, urban-scaled townscape, comprising a major activity centre and related urban villages based on 'main street' principles.'

During the consultation there was no direct comments from the community regarding the validity or relevance of the existing Centre Plan vision. Notwithstanding this, throughout the consultation there were some clear themes and elements (highlighted in section 8.1) which are valued by the community, but not adequately captured in the existing vision.

In reviewing the existing vision there is an opportunity to include greater reference to some of these themes. Interweaving commonly reported elements such as 'green', 'pedestrian focused' and 'unique coastal atmosphere' will allow for a tangible response to the pre-engagement outcomes, and a more distinguished precinct vision.

These common themes should also be carried through and referenced in the Precinct Structure Plan Design principles.

Planning system and framework

A key theme raised by the businesses and stakeholders was the need to ensure flexibility in the planning framework to respond to the market and the needs of the community. In order to remain robust and adaptable over time, the requirements of the plan should, where possible, have an element of flexibility.

There was also a number of comments raised relating to reducing red tape and the City being more of a partner in innovative thinking and working with proponents to develop concepts, plans and ideas.

Having a robust, flexible planning framework will provide land owners and developers greater scope to develop and activate their property in order to achieve the long term vision of the centre and support the local Rockingham community. This will encourage greater investment in the area.

Raising public awareness

The lack of awareness of the existing framework is also notable, and this review presents an opportunity to provide a greater level of awareness of the framework within the community, and provide a simple explanation of the precinct planning framework and possible timeframes for implementation.

There was also a lack of awareness of the proposed rapid transit system between the train station and foreshore.



9. ENGAGEMENT EVALUATION

Evaluating community engagement involves assessing the quality of the engagement process. It seeks to measure how well the engagement process was planned, implemented and managed and informs continuous improvement of the engagement approach.

At the commencement of the project, targets were set to ensure that the engagement process could be measured and so that the project team could assess if feedback had been received from a good cross section of the subject community. Table 2 provides a quick evaluation of engagement targets established at the start of the process.

- + **Connected village precincts** between the City Centre and Rockingham Beach **along the route of the transit system**.
- + The new village precincts will make provision for **mixed and consolidated education (university), technology, commercial and medium to high density residential development**, based on sustainable planning principles and design criteria.

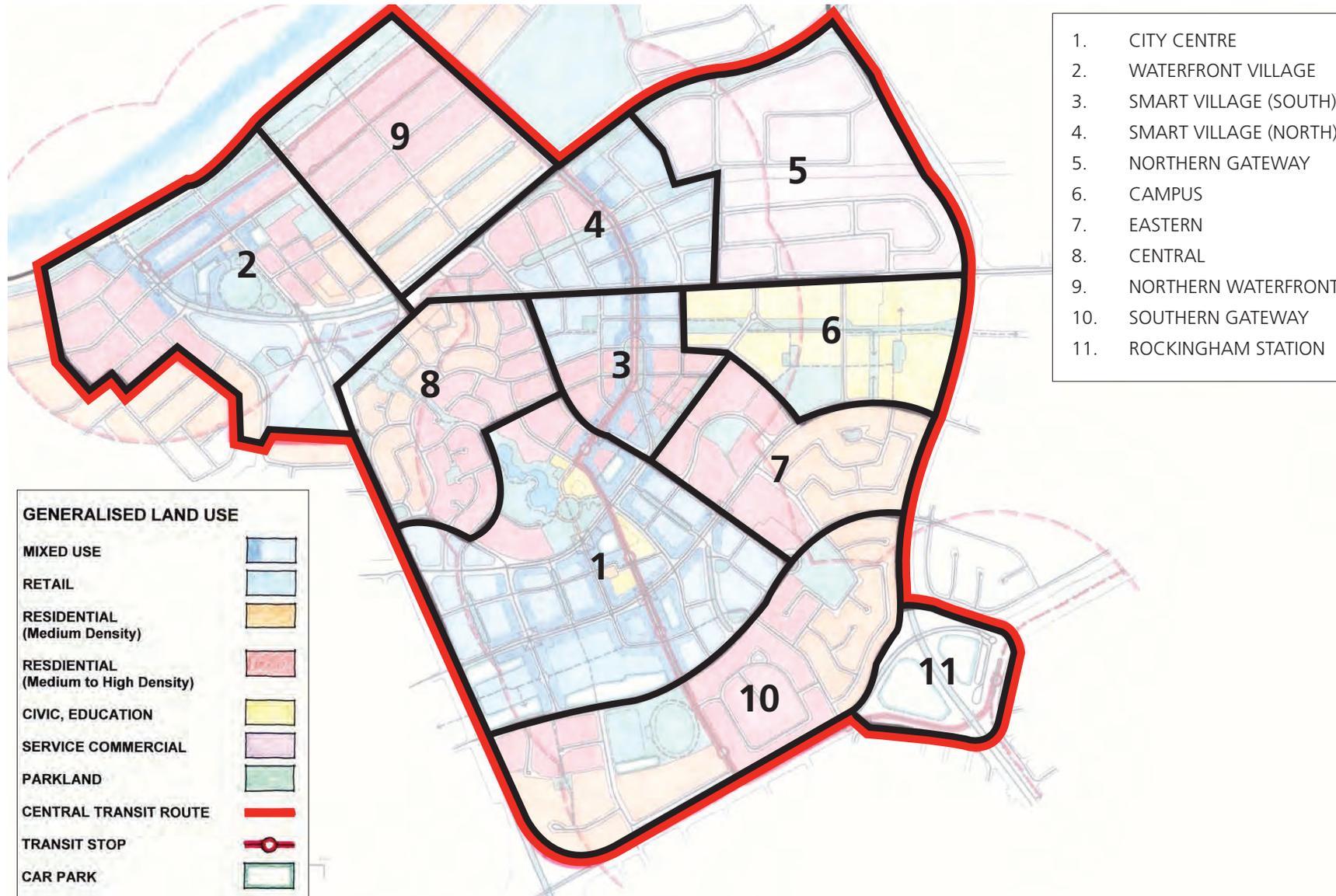

A community member who was unable to attend the workshops provided the following comments:

I am concerned about checking out the options that were proposed for a Performance Theatre for the Arts, which included options of extended art rooms around Gary Holland and whilst keeping the Village Green? Other proposals seemed to suggest the Old Murdoch University Building on Dixon Road, though not sure that is still part of the ideas I saw. Nevertheless I would like to express support for the growing arts cultures to be given consideration in Rockingham for this idea as Arts play a much bigger role than seems to be recognised in maintaining healthy adults and children as they develop their artistic journey, Currently workshops are run regularly and well supported but more gallery space, perhaps an artist in residence gallery area or two, as well as other art rooms should not be ruled out. A performing arts theatre to the other side of Gary Holland, away from the parking area, would be one way to extend or forward from the back room at the bottom of Gary Holland? This would enable existing facilities to still fit well.

I couldn't attend on 28th July unfortunately, but didn't want to not register support for this idea. I believe members of the RRA have suggested a few good ideas and this certainly needs to be kept on the books for future planning.
