

FOGO Like a Pro

Collection Starts 30 June 2025

The City of Rockingham is implementing a FOGO waste collection service at the **end of June 2025** to reduce the amount of waste going to landfill.

FOGO stands for Food Organics, Garden Organics and is an extension to the existing three bin GO (Garden Organics) service we already have in our City.

Many other local governments have already moved to FOGO under the state government's commitment to support all local governments in the Perth and Peel regions to go FOGO by 2025. FOGO allows you to add food waste along with garden waste to your green-lidded bin. The contents of your FOGO bin will be converted into compost, mulch and soil conditioner which can be re-used in parks and gardens. Once FOGO collections start **your green bin will be collected weekly**, your red bin will be collected fortnightly, and your yellow bin will continue to be collected fortnightly.

There will be some changes to how and when your waste is collected in the coming months but we'll be keeping you up to date as we go. Over the coming months you will receive:

- A letter to your residential address explaining your new collection schedule.
- Your FOGO kitchen caddy, compostable caddy liners and tips on how to FOGO like a pro delivered to your property.
- In-person community information sessions. Keep an eye on the City's website and Facebook page for more details being announced soon.

Did you know that organic waste makes up almost 50% of what we put into our red bin?

With FOGO, food scraps go into our green lid bin, reducing the amount going into the red bin, and reducing what goes to landfill.

You've been a great sort for years, separating your garden waste and recycling from your general waste.

When FOGO collection starts on 30 June it will be time to take the last step in the three bin system - separating your food scraps. We're making that easy for you by delivering a kitchen caddy with some compostable liners, and a guide on how to FOGO, straight to your house.



We will start delivering kitchen caddies at the end of April, so you'll be ready to FOGO like a pro when collections start on **30 June 2025**.

Major Projects





Baldivis Sports Complex

The final stage is well underway with electrical pits and conduits for floodlighting, the stormwater drainage system and footings for tiered seating for spectator areas. The final stage will deliver outdoor netball and tennis courts, a southern pavilion, a youth play space and extra parking.



Stan Twight Reserve

Significant progress has been made on the Stan Twight Reserve Clubroom Redevelopment, with the key construction milestones being met. The project continues to take shape and is moving steadily toward completion, expected to be by the end of 2025.

Advocacy



The City's sustained advocacy efforts have helped secure positive outcomes in several matters recently, including:

Premier Cook's announcement in January that \$7 million in funding will be made available for upgrading the intersection of Baldivis Rd and Kulija Rd.

The state government calling for Expressions of Interest for a marina at Wanliss St in Rockingham.

The federal government committing to build 550 additional new households for Defence personnel and their families in Rockingham, Baldivis and nearby areas.

The establishment of an information centre for the Australian Submarine Agency in Rockingham where members of the public can access information about the Navy's activities.

The state and federal governments' funding of studies into the feasibility of the Garden Island Highway to support increased traffic to and from the navy base.

Meanwhile, the City was disappointed the Kwinana Freeway widening project will terminate at Mortimer Rd. We will continue to advocate to the state government for a solution which addresses the growing traffic congestion facing our residents and visitors.

Around Our Community

Measuring Our Performance

Our annual Resident Perception Survey enables us to measure the performance of our services and facilities, and to evaluate the effectiveness of our communication and engagement with residents.

The survey, undertaken by an independent research company, was sent to approximately 4,000 randomly selected households in the City during November 2024.

It covers a wide range of questions, from overall perception of the City's performance, to the quantity and quality of interactions with our customers, to identifying areas we should focus on.

Similar to last year, 76% of respondents rated the City as doing Well or Very Well in key areas including rubbish collection and recycling, libraries, playing fields, fire management, parks and gardens, sport and recreation centres, festivals and events, and community centres and public halls.

The survey also identified that we can strengthen our efforts in town planning, youth programs, tourism promotion, graffiti and vandalism management, and public toilets.

Thanks to everyone who took part. The responses we receive provide an extremely useful snapshot of our resident's thoughts, and helps us continually improve.

Native Plants Giveaway

ReWild Rockingham

Through our partnership with ReWild Perth we are encouraging residents to bring nature home, through a range of online resources and in-person workshops. Two workshops scheduled in March and May will focus on attracting frogs to your garden and creating nest boxes for wildlife. Come and find out more from the ReWild team and special presenters. Sustainable Parenting Program

Through our Sustainable Parenting Program we are supporting residents to choose sustainable alternatives to disposable nappies and sanitary products, and reduce materials going to landfill.

A 50% subsidy (up to \$100) on selected products applies per household. To be eligible you only need to provide proof of address (only open to Rockingham residents) and have attended either an online consultation or in-person workshop.

Subsidies are open until 28 June 2025 or until exhausted. Terms and Conditions apply.

Safety Around Schools

Safety around schools is everyone's responsibility. Our SmartWatch team undertake patrols around schools in the City of Rockingham, and the City regularly provides a "safety around schools" fact sheet to school communities to raise awareness.

The fact sheet is also available on our website at **rockingham.wa.gov.au/schoolparking** to help improve understanding about the risks vehicles pose to children around schools.



Cat Prohibited Areas

The City has introduced cat prohibited areas. It is important to be familiar with these areas in your neighbourhood because if a domestic cat is found in a prohibited area, penalties of up to \$200 for the owner may apply. This change is authorised by the Cat Act 2011.

If your cat hasn't returned home, visit the City's Animal Management Facility page at rockingham.wa.gov.au/pound to search lost cats.

Please note, by law it is required that cats are microchipped and sterilised. Documentation checks will be required prior to collection by the registered owner.

Pet Microchip Lookup

Do you know how to confirm your pet's microchip details? It's easy at Pet Address, and it's something you should do, especially if you are not the animal's first owner. Checking will ensure:



you can be reunited if your dog or cat is lost



your pet's microchip is legally registered under your name - and if it isn't, you know which company to contact to arrange a change of details.

Restricted Burning Period

From 1 April to 31 May 2025, the City will enter a restricted burning period. During this time you are required to obtain a permit to burn. Apply online at **rockingham.wa.gov.au/permittoburn** Applications will be processed within five working days. For all other enquiries, contact Fire Control on **9528 0333**.



Storm Preparation

Storm advice and warnings are issued through Emergency WA, and you can download their handy app to your phone to stay updated with real-time notifications and warnings.

Check Your Smoke Alarms

Smoke alarms save lives. But only if they are working properly.

Now is the time to check yours:

replace the battery

vacuum around the alarm with a soft brush to remove dust and cobwebs.

Every month you should:

check the green visual display light is lit up to confirm the alarm is connected to mains power

press the "test button" until an alert tone is heard to confirm the alarm is operational.
