In July we were delighted to open the \$5 million expansion and upgrades at Koorana Reserve in Warnbro.

The Baldivis Sports Complex continues to progress towards completion later this year and in this edition you'll get a sneak-peek into how the facility looks under lights.

You might have noticed that the font size in this edition is a little bigger than previous editions. This is part of our Disability Access and Inclusion Plan which includes making our public documents more accessible for people with vision impairment.

There are so many exciting things happening in our City and I hope you enjoy reading all about them in this edition of the City Chronicle.

Koorana Reserve Upgrades Completed

Residents living in Warnbro, Waikiki, Port Kennedy and surrounding areas, and students at Koorana primary school, will have access to more sporting opportunities thanks to the \$5 million expansion and upgrade works at Koorana Reserve.

The City has delivered a major refurbishment and expansion to the existing clubrooms and two additional hectares of playing space, which includes two new soccer fields and one additional cricket oval.

The cricket nets have been expanded, reticulation has been upgraded, a new car park has been constructed, and state-of-the-art sports floodlighting has been installed.

Port Kennedy Soccer Club and Hillman Hornets Cricket Club will call the facility home for generations to come.

Hillman Hornets Cricket Club President Carl Sanders said the upgrades would allow the club to grow beyond its current 220 members and would also service both male and female members.

With the club now having facilities to cater for both men and women alike, Port Kennedy Soccer Club President Radmila Popovic said they hoped to grow their female membership through the development of women's football programs.



Aqua Jetty Stage Two

In addition to consulting with the wider community on the concept plans for Stage Two of the Aqua Jetty in Warnbro, the City has also engaged specifically with community members who have lived experience with disability. Their valuable feedback has been taken on board during the design stage to ensure the upgraded Aqua Jetty meets the needs of all community members for generations to come.

Baldivis
Sports
Complex

The main pavilion, maintenance shed and surrounds of the Baldivis Sports Complex (BSC) are almost finished, and floodlighting has been installed.

The BSC will be home to the White Knights Baldivis Cricket Club from the 2022/2023 summer season, and the Baldivis Brumbies Football and Netball Club from the 2023 winter season.

The Indoor Sports Complex and central car park will be completed by the end of 2022. The concept plan for the Baldivis Outdoor Recreation Space was endorsed by Council in June and designs for the Southern Pavilion and Outdoor Hardcourts are almost finished. Work on these final elements of the BSC will start in the first half of 2023.



This \$1.3 million project involved demolishing the existing spur groyne and breakwater, which were originally constructed in the 1970s, and building a new 20 metre longer groyne and an upgraded breakwater. In a separate project, the carpark has also been extended and upgraded, and new lighting has been installed. The new groyne provides safer conditions for people launching and retrieving their vessels.

The City will be delivering a specialised Youth Employment Program to assist local young people aged 16 - 24 access employment and training opportunities. Throughout 2022/2023 we will be taking on seven young people on a three year paid traineeship. Traineeships will be provided across a number of areas including horticulture, arboriculture, trades, business administration and engineering.

In the past year our four libraries have had over 400,000 visitors, 350,000 loans of physical items, and loaned 350,000 ebooks. Importantly, our libraries are about much more than books and offer around 1,600 programs and events for people of all ages every year.

Through all seasons our hardworking maintenance teams regularly maintain more than 440 local parks, sports fields, and conservation spaces in our community, covering almost 1,525 hectares of reserve space.

Waste collection is a core function of our operations. Over the past year our Waste Services team collected more than 54,000 tonnes of waste across our red top waste bins, yellow top recycling bins and green top greenwaste bins.

Channel 7 Rockingham Beach Cup

The Channel 7 Rockingham Beach Cup (RBC) will return to the Rockingham Foreshore on Saturday 12 and Sunday 13 November 2022.

The RBC is a unique attraction on WA's tourism calendar and Council has resolved to provide \$175,000 of Iconic Event Sponsorship to support the Rotary Club of Palm Beach WA deliver the event.

The two day spectacle features a community fair and a series of horse races along the Rockingham Foreshore.

Nearly 20,000 people attended last year's event, which injected \$1.6 million into the local economy. Significantly, for every dollar of sponsorship funding the City provided, the RBC generated \$9.15 in attendee expenditure.




Volunteers Celebrated

Rockingham Strategic Metropolitan Centre - Project Update

The City has been reviewing the local planning framework for the Rockingham City Centre, which includes the area from the Rockingham Train Station to the foreshore.

The review covered challenges and opportunities for new development, infill development and redevelopment within the City Centre, as well as improvements to the current planning framework.

Following preliminary stakeholder engagement, the City prepared the draft Rockingham Strategic Centre Precinct Structure Plan and the associated Scheme Amendment, which were supported by Council in June.

Once approval is granted by the State Government it is anticipated the Plan will be advertised for public comment later this year – and we'd love to hear your thoughts.

Helping a Threatened Species

Ten artificial nesting hollows have been installed across some of the City's conservation reserves to help protect threatened black cockatoos

Known as 'cockatubes,' the hollows provide potential nesting habitat for Carnaby's black cockatoos and forest red-tailed black cockatoos. The artificial hollows sit between six to 10 metres up a tree and are designed to last for at least 50 years.

The hollows were installed at Tamworth Hill Swamp, Baldivis Nature Reserve, Karnup Townsite, Lake Richmond and Karnup School Site.





Hazardous Waste

Do you have hazardous waste in your house? Hazardous items stored around the home can be dangerous to people and the environment. Disposing chemicals in your bins can cause a fire risk to City staff and pouring them down the drain can contaminate waterways or drinking water.

Instead, you can dispose of chemicals for free at the Millar Road Landfill and Recycling Facility as part of the City's Hazardous Household Waste program, supported by Waste Authority.

When dropping off chemicals make sure they are kept in their original container or labelled clearly in a new container. This will help staff handle the contents safely.

A maximum of 20 kg or 20 litres per material of unwanted chemicals will be accepted per day. This includes aerosols, pesticides, solvents, and various household chemicals. Visit our website for a complete list.

2021 Sustainability Snapshot Report

Our fifth annual Sustainability Snapshot Report has recently been released. The report captures actions and initiatives from across the City as we work towards a sustainable future.

Progress is captured under six key focus areas (below) with highlights including:



Water

Our 2021 Waterwise Council Action Plan was endorsed and guides works undertaken by the City to create a Water Sensitive City. We were also re-endorsed as a Gold Waterwise Council for the third time.



Nature and Environment

11,000 seedlings were provided to residents as part of the City's annual Native Plants Giveaway.



Waste and Recycling

We began to collect household e-waste as part of a recycling and reuse program funded by Waste Authority. In 2021, more than **20 tonnes** of e-waste was collected.



Environmental Education and Engagement

Thirty two sustainability related workshops were held across City libraries.

In partnership with Grow It Local, **nine** Grow.Cook.Eat workshops were held for 205 community members in 2020/2021.



Energy and Emissions

500 new solar panels were installed in 2020/2021. In total 3,500 panels have been installed across 98 sites.

Approximately **101,000 tonnes CO₂e** (carbon dioxide equivalent) was captured from decomposing waste in landfill and converted into electricity via gas capture.

Re[Frame] Launch

The City's new Re[Frame] Mental Health Public Art Mural is now on display at McLarty Hall in Shoalwater.

The mural was inspired by people with lived experience of mental illness and showcases the strategies people use to tackle mental health issues. It's characterised by the theme "Find What Works For You" and focuses on stories of recovery. It shows how each person's recovery journey can be different.

The City gratefully acknowledges the community members who courageously shared their stories to help shape the mural.

Firebreak inspections

Firebreak inspections will begin on 1 December 2022. Owners/occupiers of developed and vacant land need to comply with the City's Fire Control Notice requirements prior to this date.

All requests for variations to firebreaks need to be submitted to the City before 31 October 2022.

Failure to comply with the City's Fire Control Notice may result in a penalty of up to \$5,000, with additional contractor and administration costs to carry out fire prevention works on your property. The City's Fire Control Notice can be found at **rockingham.wa.gov.au/firecontrol**



Permit to Burn

All owners/occupiers wishing to undertake a hazard reduction burn on their land will require a 'Permit to Burn' from 1 October 2022 to 30 November 2022. Applications can be made online at rockingham.wa.gov.au/firecontrol

Burning is strictly prohibited on all land from 1 December 2022 through to 30 March 2023. The City's Fire Control Notice can be found at

Australian Fire Danger Ratings

From 1 September 2022, the Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS) was introduced across Australia to provide consistent fire danger advice to people throughout the nation.

The new system has four ratings:

Moderate: Plan
High: Be

Anti-Poverty Week (16 – 22 October)

For the 20th anniversary of Anti-Poverty Week, the City will be working with key local organisations to provide opportunities for families and individuals to develop personal skills in managing their households and advice on where to seek further advice and support.



Pet Registrations

The new pet year starts on 1 November 2022. If your pet goes missing, your chances of being reunited will be massively improved if you have maintained their registration.

If you have changed address let us know so the microchipping database can be updated. A sterilised dog or cat can be registered for their lifetime for only \$100. Receive a 50% discount if a valid Pension Concession Card, or a WA Seniors Card with a Commonwealth Seniors Health Card is presented.

Please remember penalties apply if your pet is unregistered.
