Major Projects

Stan Twight Reserve Clubroom Redevelopment

The construction contract for the Stan Twight Reserve Clubroom Redevelopment was awarded to Shelford Constructions. Work is expected to commence in September 2024, including:



demolition of the existing clubhouse building



upgrade to floodlighting



construction of a new clubhouse and changeroom facility



extension to the existing car park area.

The redevelopment will provide a much needed functional clubroom and changeroom facility at the reserve for Shoalwater Bay Cricket and Sporting Club, Safety Bay Stingers Football Club and Rockingham Districts AFL Masters.

Funding partners include:

- Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries through the Community Sporting Recreation and Facilities Fund.
- Australian Football League and West Australian Football Commission via the WA Football Facilities Fund.
- Western Australian Cricket Association through the Australian Cricket Infrastructure Fund.

The clubs also contributed to embellishments in the kitchen and social space.

Karnup | district structure plan



The Karnup District Structure Plan (KDSP) project is now in the stakeholder engagement, visioning and design phase.

During July and August we held two workshops with environmental and First Nations groups, various other local and state government stakeholders, and community members to discuss their vision for the future of Karnup. Feedback received during these sessions will be used to develop an overall project vision, and to guide the preparation of the District Structure Plan, including zoning and land use, and the locations for future housing, shops, schools, and open spaces. We are now compiling the Community Outcomes and Vision report that we intend to present to Council towards the end of 2024.

The preparation of a District Structure Plan takes about three years, however physical development in the area may not be seen for a number of years.

Beach Access Works

Waikiki Foreshore Universal Access Ramp

From August to the end of October 2024 Waikiki Foreshore universal access pedestrian ramp will be closed for refurbishment. While the work is being done beachgoers are encouraged to use the access stairs located a few hundred meters to the north, or the ramp located to the south. The City apologises for the inconvenience.

Australia Day Celebrations Survey

In December 2022 the federal government gave local councils the choice to hold Australia Day celebrations and citizenship ceremonies on any day between 23 and 29 January. In April 2023 Council voted to move Australia Day events to the Saturday nearest to 26 January. In 2024 those events were held on 27 January.

Following a decision from Council in March 2024 the City commissioned an independent research consultant to survey 10,000 residents in our community about their preferred date for our Australia Day celebrations. The survey has now closed and the results will be presented to Council for consideration at the Ordinary Council Meeting on 24 September 2024. The City thanks all respondents for sharing their thoughts about the future of our community's Australia Day celebrations.

Safety Bay Pump and Jump Track

The fences came down in late July and this neighbourhood level track has already been given a solid workout by riders of all ages. Come to the June Road Reserve in Safety Bay and check it out. Beach Access Equipment

Not long now before the weather starts warming up (we hope), and as we head into the warmer months, what better time to enjoy our beautiful coastline?

The City provides free beach wheelchair hire and beach matting to improve access to the coast for people with disability and those with limited mobility. Beach matting is available at seven beaches during October through to April, depending on coastal and weather conditions. Beach wheelchairs and walkers are available year-round. We recommend calling ahead of your visit to ensure that matting has been installed, and to book wheelchairs and walkers in advance to avoid disappointment.

ReWild – Bring Nature Home

The City is excited to announce its partnership with Perth NRM and the Perth South West Metropolitan Alliance for ReWild – a program that invites people and businesses in urban areas to increase (or introduce) native habitat into their space. This can significantly help native wildlife by creating little pockets of habitat throughout our suburbs, reconnecting our vital reserves and green spaces, and beautifying your garden.

You can be part of the ReWild movement and bring nature home by participating in a number of workshops the City has planned for the Rockingham area. Keep an eye on the Sustainability and Environment page on our website, as well as social media, for all upcoming events.

Polyphagous Shot Hole Borer

The Polyphagous shot hole borer (PSHB) is a serious declared pest. The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) is working hard to eradicate it as part of a nationally coordinated and funded biosecurity response because if it gets established in WA it could significantly impact our urban canopy and agricultural industry.

Detecting PSHB is difficult as they are very small – about the size of a sesame seed. Tell-tale signs include multiple entrance holes in the trunk or branches about the size of a ballpoint pen tip, frass or sawdust, and dieback.



PSHB hasn't been recorded in the City of Rockingham yet, and we need your help to keep it out. Look for the signs of this damaging pest and report anything suspicious via the MyPestGuide® Reporter app or to the DPIRD Pest and Disease Information Service on **9368 3080** or **padis@dpird.wa.gov.au** For more information visit **agric.wa.gov.au/borer**

Fight the Bite

Spring is the start of mosquito season. The City, as part of the Peel Mosquito Management Group, is conducting mosquito treatments in the saltmarsh areas near Karnup to keep mosquito numbers low.

You can help fight the bite:

- remove, empty or cover water-holding containers around the home
- check fly screens and cover rainwater/septic tank openings with mosquito-proof mesh
- keep swimming pools properly maintained and free of debris
- cover up with loose-fitting clothing, especially at dawn and dusk
- apply insect repellent containing DEET or picaridin when outdoors.

Green Waste Verge Collection

The City's residential green waste verge collections are starting soon. Collections will take place from October to November 2024.

Please ensure you limit your waste to 3 cubic metres (3 m x 1 m x 1 m). Only put it out on your verge no more than two days before your collection date.

Community Safety starts with you



Community Safety

Maintaining close links with local police is very important in the City's ongoing efforts to reinforce a strong sense of community safety.

Mayor Deb Hamblin and CEO Michael Parker met recently with the new Officer in Charge at the Rockingham Police Station, Snr Sgt Scott Starkie, to talk about some of the things that concern our residents.

Some of the key issues discussed included:

• the importance of reporting incidents promptly to help police build the bigger picture of what's happening in the community

- limiting the opportunity for thieves by removing valuables from vehicles and ensuring vehicles, garages and houses are locked
- encouraging residents to register their own CCTV cameras on Cam-Map WA – a secure database, operated by WA Police, of all voluntarily registered CCTV systems across WA which helps in the investigation of incidents.

This free online financial education includes a variety of short videos, resources and educational courses to help you better understand budgeting, how a spending plan works, how debt works, and how to get out and stay out of debt. Home Cooling Subsidy Scheme

The City is offering a Home Cooling Subsidy Scheme to low income residents who hold a Health Care or Pensioner Concession card. It can be used for a variety of products, such as:

- thermal items (ceiling fans, ceiling insulation, eave vents, air conditioners)
- window systems (window shutters, block-out curtains/blinds, awnings)
- shade options (shade sails, external venetian blinds)



• other products (cooling pillows, pedestal fan).

Christmas Hamper Donation

Local emergency relief organisations are always grateful for donations of food, vouchers and gifts to support local families in need at Christmas. Items that are in particular demand this year include:

A New Australian Warning System – Know the Signs

The Australian Warning System (AWS) is a new simple national warning system for natural hazards like storm, bushfire, flood, cyclones, extreme heat and severe weather. The AWS provides a nationally consistent set of warnings and icons, so no matter where you are in Australia, you will know what to do to stay safe in an emergency.

Permit to Burn

Burning is strictly prohibited on all land from 1 December 2024 to 31 March 2025. Residential properties are not permitted to burn green waste or other refuse at any time.

Rural or Special Rural property owners wanting to undertake hazard reduction burns will need a 'Permit to Burn' from 1 October to 30 November 2024. Applications can be made via **rockingham.wa.gov.au/firecontrol**

Requests to vary firebreaks need to be submitted to the City before 31 October 2024. Approvals expire on 31 May each year, therefore a new application to vary is required.
