Advocacy





AUKUS

The City has developed an advocacy plan that guides our efforts to secure support from other levels of government in key areas.

One of the major issues we are currently advocating to government about is AUKUS.

The City is in regular contact with all levels of government through a range of agencies to ensure we can capitalise on the opportunities, and meet the challenges, AUKUS will bring.

To more fully understand what we are facing as AUKUS ramps up, Mayor Deb Hamblin and CEO Michael Parker joined a group of other Mayors and CEOs from the Perth South West Metropolitan Alliance (PSWMA) on a fact-finding mission to the US during September.

The group visited major defence towns like San Diego and Newport News, which have built mutually beneficial relationships with their navy neighbours over many years. The most important lessons learned were around communication and relationships, and gaining a first-hand understanding of how cities dealing with the impacts of similar projects are working together to ensure positive outcomes for their communities.

A detailed report is being prepared by PSWMA and will help each of the Alliance's member councils in their interactions with Defence and other stakeholders as this massive national project moves forward.

Recently PSWMA met with Deputy PM and Minister for Defence Hon. Richard Marles. We were able to reiterate the local infrastructure needs, particularly around transport, and the need for more effective communication with local communities.

Cape Peron Transport Study

To reduce pressure on the local road network in the Cape Peron area, one potential solution could be the development of the Garden Island Highway within a road reserve which has been in the Metropolitan Region Scheme since 1975.

The City has advocated to the state and federal governments for many years to progress a feasibility study to determine the viability of constructing the highway within the existing reservation.

This position was reaffirmed at the October Council Meeting, but with the additional requirement that the feasibility study considers the technical evidence-based findings of the recently completed Cape Peron Transport Study.

Major Projects





Baldivis Sports Complex Final Stage

The tender to construct the final stage of the Baldivis Sports Complex was awarded to the MG Group at the 27 August Council Meeting. This stage will include eight netball (multi-marked) hard courts, eight tennis courts with floodlighting, and a pavilion to service both the hard courts and users of the southern grassed playing fields.

It will also include an Outdoor Recreation Space with accessible and sensory play, ninja circuit and skatepark adjacent to the indoor sports complex, providing a subdistrict level youth space for a wide range of ages and abilities.

The site has been designed to ensure the wider community, who are not involved in competitive sport, can access and use the facilities.

Stan Twight Reserve New Clubroom and Changerooms

The old clubroom at Stan Twight Reserve has been fully demolished making way for the new clubroom and changeroom building. The construction works are now underway and are expected to be completed by late 2025.

Green Your Street

Our Urban Greening Plan aims to increase the tree canopy cover across the City of Rockingham to cool our neighbourhoods, refresh the air, and provide habitat to local wildlife. Request a free tree to be planted on your verge.

Our team will assess your verge and work with you to select a suitable tree for the site. The tree and all associated materials are provided by the City at no cost to you. We will also take care of ongoing pruning, re-staking and management of pests and diseases.

Bulk Verge Collection Review

As part of our Waste Plan we are doing a review of the City's current bulk waste verge collections to see how our residents feel about this service. The review aims to identify a better way to assist our community to manage hard waste and green waste, to boost recycling and reduce waste to landfill. This aligns to our community Aspiration – Natural Environment in our Strategic Community Plan where a key objective is to minimise waste.

The review will look at alternative options outlined in the WALGA Better Practice Verge Collection Guidelines, and at what other local governments are doing. We ran a survey and held community engagement workshops from October to December. Thanks to everyone who took the time to get involved. We are compiling the feedback and will share the results of this review, and the next steps, in 2025.



Let's Go FOGO in mid-2025



Did you know that food waste makes up approximately 50% of our general waste?

If combined with garden waste at kerbside collection, we can divert all this waste from landfill to create a rich compost and soil conditioner for our gardens.

The state government is supporting the introduction of this best-practice three-bin system throughout all local governments in the Perth and Peel regions by 2025.

Do your bit to ensure a sustainable future by recovering valuable material currently sent to landfill. Our Community's Vision is: "A quality lifestyle. A sustainable future", and it's one of our Community Aspirations to be a place of natural beauty where the environment is respected.

As part of our Waste Plan the City of Rockingham is implementing a FOGO waste collection service by the end of June 2025. This is an expansion of the existing three-bin GO (Garden Organic) service.

You're already a GREAT sort, separating your Garden Organics (GO) from general waste so here's a few things you might like to know about Food Organics (FO), and the FOGO rollout in the City of Rockingham in mid-2025.

What is FOGO?

FOGO stands for Food Organics, Garden Organics. With the FOGO service you will be able to add food waste along with garden waste to your green bin for kerbside collection. The contents of a FOGO bin can be turned into compost, mulch and soil conditioner, diverting materials from landfill.

Why is the City of Rockingham moving to FOGO?

The less we send to landfill, the better for our natural environment. We are joining multiple other local governments that have moved to the FOGO collection service under the state government's commitment to support all local governments in the Perth and Peel regions to go FOGO by 2025.

What do I need to do?

Nothing until the middle of 2025.

How will I get my FOGO kitchen caddy?

It will be delivered to your house before FOGO collection starts in mid-2025.

What you can do now to reduce waste going to landfill.

- Visit the waste education page on the City's website to learn about some different ways to reduce the waste being sent to landfill.
- Search for 'Turn The Tide on Plastics' to see how the City supports moving away from single use plastics.
- Go reusable: The City has introduced a reusable nappy and menstrual products subsidy. Visit the environmental programs page on the City's website to see if you are eligible and apply today.



Waterwise Irrigation Rebate

Hotter summers and sandy soils can make it difficult to maintain healthy gardens. Choosing the right plant species and optimising garden design can reduce water usage.

Water Corporation is offering a waterwise irrigation rebate to support households save on water this summer. Limited offer before 31 May 2025 or until allocations exhausted.

Staying Healthy In a Heatwave

Australia is likely to experience increases in heatwave frequency, intensity and duration. As part of the Western Australian Council of Social Services funded Heat Vulnerability Project, the City has developed a number of initiatives to help residents at greater risk from the impacts of high heat to better prepare, respond and recover from heatwaves.

During periods of high heat this summer, Heatwave Activity Tables will be setup in City libraries which include a range of free games, and arts and craft fun. If you're looking for an air-conditioned venue other than your home to escape the heat, visit a library near you.

Download the BOM Weather App and use your current location to receive heatwave warning notifications and 7-day forecasts to help you prepare and stay healthy during periods of high heat.





Looking After Pets During Hot Weather

Just like their humans, animals can be affected by heat stress or heat stroke. Dogs can only release heat through areas not covered by fur and need a little more TLC.



Make sure there is plenty of fresh water and shade in a well-ventilated area.



Place a small paddling pool in a shaded area to help keep them cool.



Never leave them in a vehicle – it takes less than 10-minutes for a car to reach harmful temperatures even when parked in the shade with the windows open.



Stroll early in the morning or just before bed and stick to grassy areas so they're not walking on hot pavements.



Fire Prevention

The City is now in a prohibited burning period until 31 March 2025. If you see smoke or fire, please call '000'. During this period, no burning is allowed on any property, or on any beach, within the City of Rockingham.

The City's Fire Control Officers have commenced firebreak inspections on rural and special-rural properties. Learn more about your responsibilities to comply with the City's Fire Control Notice by visiting **rockingham.wa.gov.au/firecontrol** or contact Fire Control on **9528 0333**.
