

The Baldivis Indoor Sports Complex is providing sporting and social opportunities for people of all ages thanks to its four indoor courts that cater for basketball, netball, badminton, volleyball, indoor soccer and floorball.

## Lotterywest Funding Secured for Baldivis Outdoor Recreation Space



The delivery of the next phase of the Baldivis Sports Complex (BSC) has been boosted after the City secured a \$1 million grant from Lotterywest to assist in the delivery of the Baldivis Outdoor Recreation Space.

The Baldivis Outdoor Recreation Space will be an inclusive community asset that caters to a wide range of abilities. It will feature a nature playground, skate park, adventure play area and an activity challenge circuit. The space will be overlooked by the café that's been delivered as part of the Baldivis Indoor Sports Complex.

The construction of the Southern Pavilion and outdoor hardcourts will also take place in the next phase of the BSC. Pictured: Baldivis MLA Reece Whitby presented Mayor Deb Hamblin with the \$1 million Lotterywest grant certificate.

### **Kicking Goals at Stan Twight Reserve**

The City has kicked a major early goal in the Stan Twight Reserve Clubroom Redevelopment project, after successfully securing a \$1 million grant from the State Government's Community Sporting and Recreation Facilities Fund (CSRFF).

The funding will contribute towards the development of a pavilion and floodlighting at Stan Twight Reserve. Design work on the upgrades are well underway, and the project will include the construction of a new club room and change rooms. Change rooms suitable for all genders and umpires change rooms will be part of the design.

Construction on a larger carpark has already begun, as has work on the reserve. Once complete it will include the relocation of two turf cricket wickets, establishment of a floodlit main AFL oval and creation of space for two senior size AFL and cricket fields. The upgrades will enhance opportunities for junior and women's cricket competitions.

In addition to the CSRFF grant, the City also secured \$50,000 from the WA Football Commission to contribute to the delivery of AFL infrastructure at the facility.

# Advocating for our Community

Did you know the City has an Advocacy Plan focused on securing support from the State and federal governments to help deliver important services and infrastructure?

As a designated Strategic Metropolitan Centre, the City is required to provide a range of services and amenities for a population that is expected to reach approximately 243,000 (figure: forecast.id) by 2046. This is a major task and requires support from stakeholders in all tiers of government.

The City's advocacy projects are divided into four categories including Economy and Tourism, Sport and Recreation, Strategic Metropolitan Centre, and Transport.

Proactive efforts in this space include the \$12.5 million that was secured for the Baldivis Sports Complex, \$10 million from the State for Aqua Jetty Stage two, and the funding highlighted above regarding Stan Twight Reserve and the Baldivis Outdoor Recreation Space.

The draft SCP will be presented to Council shortly. Following this, the draft will be advertised for further input from the community.






## Rockingham Strategic Centre Update

## **Freedom of Entry to Strengthen Ties**

In early spring the City is excited to be hosting a Freedom of Entry for HMAS Stirling. This rare and prestigious civic event will take place throughout the Rockingham foreshore precinct and the Rockingham War Memorial, located at the Village Green.

As the largest naval base in Australia, the City of Rockingham has held close ties with HMAS Stirling since it was commissioned in 1978. The base hosts a workforce of more than 3,600 staff which includes active duty members, defence civilians and long term contractors.

Many HMAS Stirling staff are local residents, and the base contributes significantly to the local economy. With billions of dollars to be invested in the base over the next decade, the City's relationship with Defence will continue to grow well into the future. ## **Aqua Jetty Celebrates 20 Years**

The City's premier aquatic and health facility, Aqua Jetty, recently celebrated its 20th anniversary with a free community open day. The facility was officially opened in April 2003 by former Mayor Chris Elliott and former WA Premier Dr Geoff Gallop.

At the time it was the largest community capital investment ever undertaken by the City. Since opening 20 years ago, thousands of community members have taken advantage of the programs, activities and facilities at Agua Jetty.

Aqua Jetty's 20th birthday marks another big milestone for City facilities in 2023. Earlier in the year the Rockingham Aquatic Centre turned 50, the Baldivis Sports Complex opened, and in the coming months the City's Autumn Centre and Mike Barnett Sports Complex will turn 30 and 40 respectively.

## **Archaeological Dig**

The dig was guided by the City's Heritage Strategy and it unearthed several artefacts including a one shilling coin from 1880, an intact Rosella sauce bottle from the early 1900s and a broken table plate.

The City's libraries are a wealth of information. Over the past year we've had around 730,000 loans and returns, and around 550,000 eResources accessed. So, whether you want to relax and enjoy a book reading, movie screening, eBook, magazine, or our wealth of digital resources like the studio (pictured) – there is something for everyone to enjoy.

Our libraries host more than 1,500 programs and events each year, and community members can hire out a range of meeting rooms and activity spaces.

Library staff are always keen to help, and in the past 12 months alone they've responded to about 50,000 enquiries. This includes running around 400 one-on-one technology help sessions dealing with everything from setting up a new mobile phone, to running computer software.

## South-Western Snake Neck Turtle in the City's Wetlands

Have you seen a South-Western Snake Neck Turtle (*Chelodina oblonga*)? We'd love to hear from you as part of a program to monitor our local populations.

The South-Western Snake Neck Turtle is the apex predator of City's wetlands and plays a crucial role in maintaining wetland ecological health. The City has been monitoring turtle populations in these wetlands since 2019, engaging expert researchers from Murdoch University.

Last year the City joined the Saving our Snake-Necked Turtle (SOSNT) program which is a collaborative local government project supported by Murdoch University's Harry Butler Institute and the Perth South West Metropolitan Alliance. This project captured important data and has protected identified nests from predation, with 550 turtles observed and 280 nests protected. The City will continue to participate in this project with the goal of better understanding local populations of this species and contributing to improving an understanding of the species more broadly.

## Plastic Free July 2023

The City has signed up once again with Plastic Free July for 2023.

Inappropriately discarded plastics items are a major, immediate, local environmental problem.

Recent findings from a Perth Metropolitan Area Litter Survey found hard plastic fragments as the top litter item on WA beaches.

Another study found that 71% of coastal litter found in the 183 surveyed locations was plastic.

We can all help be part of the solution, and the perfect time to start is Plastic Free July. Here are some tips:

- Avoid products wrapped in singleuse plastic by buying in bulk and bring your own bags when shopping.
- Reuse what you already have available.
- Refuse any plastics that have the potential to escape as litter.
- Recycle what cannot be avoided.

## **Gold Waterwise Council**

The City's efforts to save water through the Waterwise Council Program have been recognised, with the City receiving re-endorsement as a Gold Waterwise Council.

To achieve re-endorsement as a Gold Waterwise Council the City is required to report on the goals of its 2021 Waterwise Council Action Plan. Key actions in the last reporting period include:


- Reducing the City's potable corporate water usage by 3,056 kilolitres.
- Planting 15,000 trees since 2017 through the City's Greening Plan.
- Delivering the annual Native Plants Giveaway event, with thousands of free seedlings provided to residents to help them establish water wise gardens.
- Improving leak detection and repairs to water lines and irrigation systems at the City's biggest water consuming sites.



## Winter Sprinkler Switch-Off

Groundwater is a precious resource and just like tap water should be used wisely. Since 2010, the Winter Sprinkler Switch-Off has applied to residents in the City of Rockingham and requires garden irrigation to be turned off from 1 June – 31 August.

During winter, cooler temperatures and lower evaporation rates mean that our gardens don't require as much water. By letting the rain take care of your lawn and garden instead you can save water. ## Are you Storm ready?

#### **Get Ready Rockingham**

Having an up to date emergency kit can better prepare you for all hazards, and can help if you are required to leave at short notice. Here are some tips:

- Pack an emergency kit containing items such as a first aid kit, radio, torch, water and non-perishable food.
- Make sure everyone in your household knows where the kit is located.
- · Regularly check and update any expired items.
- · Consider your animals when preparing your kit.
- Know in advance where your household will evacuate to, including animals in an emergency.
- Mobile phones, chargers, bank cards and computers can be added as last minute additions.
- Keep your property well maintained during the year, clear your gutters and tie down any loose items around the property.


## Community Transport

## **Subsidy Scheme**

The City's Subsidy Scheme provides reimbursements to residents with eligible concession cards to help them stay safe and connected at home. Up to \$150 is available per financial year in each category: Safety (18+); Information Technology (60+); and Home Modifications and Assistive Equipment (60+). ## Homelessness Week 2023

The City will join a range of local services to mark Homelessness Week on Tuesday 8 August 2023 from 10am - 1pm at Rockingham Salvation Army, Cnr Willmott Drive and Read Street, Cooloongup.

Teams from specialist homelessness services such as St Patrick's Kwob Kaalak and Rockingham Salvation Army will be available to provide support and explore referral pathways with people looking for additional assistance.

Rockingham Anglicare will be on hand to provide advice on dealing with rental stress and the Street Doctor van will be available to provide support on health concerns alongside access to medical advice. SCALES Community Legal Service will also be available to support people with legal concerns around tenancies. For a full list of services and resources available visit the City's website.
